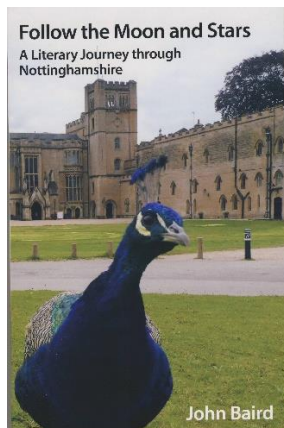
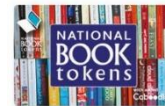

New, from Five Leaves Publications in association with Nottingham UNESCO City of Literature, **Follow the Moon and the Stars**, by John Baird. The book celebrates the literary accomplishments of the county from authors of the past (Byron, D H Lawrence, Helen Cresswell etc.) to our more recent successful authors. This is also a guide to bookshops within the county. Bookworm gets a mention for having been on the high-street for 25 years and still offering a book ordering service. It's a delight to read and is one of those books which will have you exclaiming, 'Well, I never knew that!'. It's a comprehensive book with 480 pages and is illustrated in colour throughout. 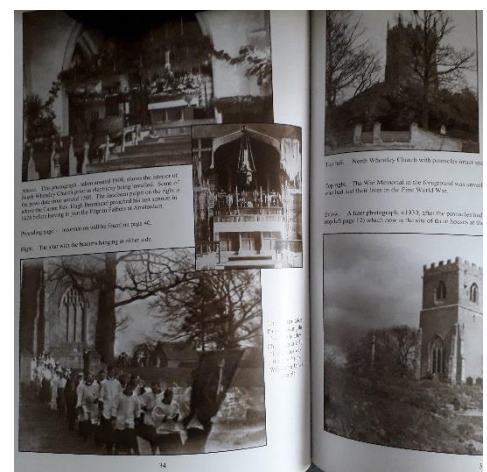
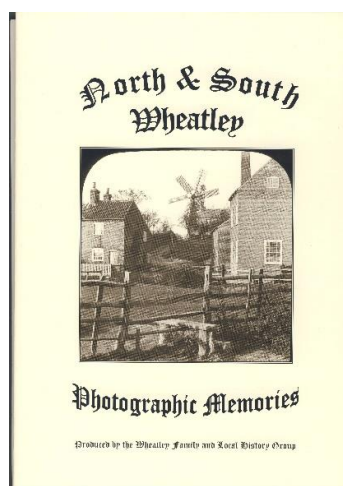

The history of 'religious freedom' within the county can be read in *From Here We Changed the World* by Adrian Gray.

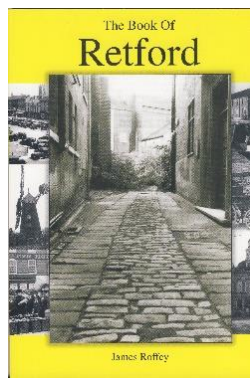
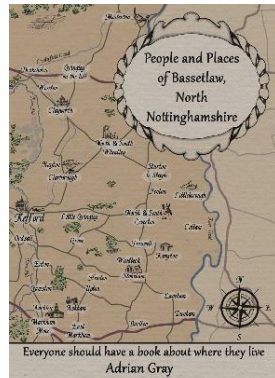
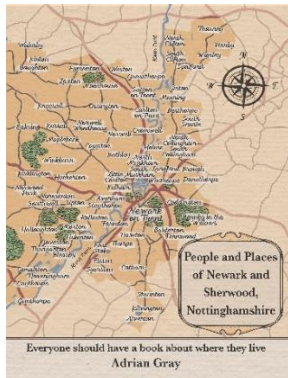
## Bookworm's Website

We are gradually adding more books to our website. Most of them have a local history theme though you will also find other books published by us on a wide range of topics.

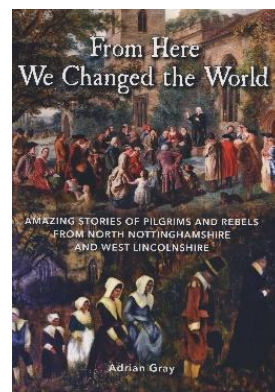
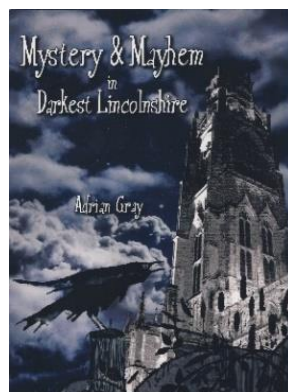
A few years ago the North & South Wheatley History Group produced this book. It is a great collection of photos and captions. A4 in size, 64 pages, £10



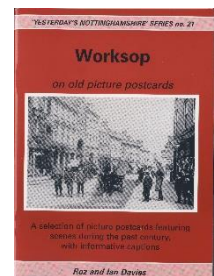
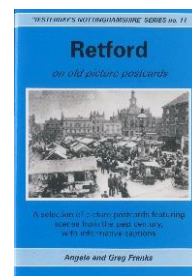

***Piranesi*** by Suzanna Clarke. The main story takes place in a 'parallel world', a world accessed by those with a unique power of the mind. It's weird but compelling reading. Readers might like this if they enjoy books by Ben Aaronovitch or Neil Gaiman. (Winner of the Women's Prize 2001)

***...And Away*** by Bob Mortimer. After enjoying the Mortimer and Whitehouse TV series, *Gone Fishing*, I was intrigued to read Mortimer's backstory. It's very well written, funny and better than his TV show with Vic Reeves!

***The Last House on Needless Street*** by Catriona Ward. A clever psychological thriller. Not too scary unless you are easily scared! (A Richard and Judy Bookclub bestseller)

Mr Bookworm is reading ***The Old Ways*** by Robert Macfarlane. This is travel writing in a literary style. Long-distance walking experiences with nights slept in the open under the stars (no tent) create imagery sharper than any fictional thriller! (Shortlisted for the Samuel Johnson Prize)
