#### Law & Order

Dave Airey's regular updates on issues of local interest are more completely covered in his monthly reports, posted on our community website plus Neighbourhood Alerts available to subscribers, also summarised on our website. We can't emphasise more strongly that this free service is in everyone's best interests, so go online and enrol. Here we note a few 'hot' issues:

- Don't leave your car 'warming up' on frosty mornings – it might not be there when you come out!
- Metal thefts continue, particularly in isolated locations. Think carefully about securing vulnerable items/machinery and also explore the range of anti-theft technology now available. See Crimebeat articles for details.
- Nottinghamshire Trading Standards also link into the Alert network with constant updates on rogue traders such as gutter cleaners and bogus charity collectors who have recently been operating locally.
- Lincolnshire Police have posted information about the legal requirements for charity collecting or selling 'door-to-door'. This is valuable information outlining how you can





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identify bona fide folks from rogues.

So, don't delay – go to your community website www.clarborough-welham.org.uk Law & Order section to explore all of these issues – and more. Clarborough & Welham has enjoyed a long period of very low crime – much of the credit goes to local people who remain alert and vigilant.

# **Clarborough Post Office**

The Post Office in Clarborough closed in November 2010 for reasons which are not pertinent to this article. Since I was aware that other local villages had the benefit of a Mobile Post Office service operated by the Postmaster of North Wheatley, I approached him about a similar service for Clarborough to operate for such time before our local service could be resumed.

The Post Office were approached to approve such an arrangement, this received a summary refusal. On appeal the Post Office position was that the level of business in Clarborough was too great for a mobile service to handle. The Post Office's solution was a "Post Office Local", which means a local retail business having a Post Office counter with all the necessary connections to "Head Office". The big difference being that the funding is undertaken by the business, then being reimbursed, rather than a Salaried Post Office position.

It would have been possible to operate such a unit in the Village Hall (with the necessary permission of the Community Association) and the Wheatley Postmaster was willing to undertake that task. However the Post Office position was that if that option was taken it would have to be permanent and could not be moved back to the original Post Office or indeed to any other retail business. The Parish Council did not feel that it would be appropriate for it to jeopardise the sale of the existing Post Office business by following this route. Perversely because we have too much Post Office business to conduct in the village we finish up with no facilities rather than one which may have been stretched at times, it's a funny old world isn't it, bureaucracy rules.

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# Clarborough Primary School was subjected to an Ofsted inspection over 6-7 December, 2011

## **Main findings**

The school provides a good standard of education for all its pupils. The small numbers in year groups mean that it is not possible to generalise about trends over time, or between different groups of pupils. However, individual pupils, from varied starting points, make good, and in a few cases outstanding, progress, as they move up the school. The standards they reach by the end of Year 6 in English and mathematics are above those found nationally. The Early Years Foundation Stage is good: children are very well known as individuals. They settle into routines quickly and make good progress from the outset. The school provides outstanding care, guidance

The school provides outstanding care, guidance and support for its pupils. The depth of teachers' knowledge of each pupil is impressive and the promotion of the selfworth of each individual, including those with special educational needs and/or disabilities, is at the heart of the school's work. Pupils say very confidently how safe they feel at school. They feel free from the fear of bullying and they are well informed about personal safety.

The school engages exceptionally well with parents and carers. It provides detailed information about their children's progress, and communicates both formally and informally through a range of media. It welcomes parents and carers in and involves them closely in their child's learning. The school uses professional partnerships exceptionally well, particularly to enhance the support it gives to pupils whose circumstances may make them vulnerable and to keep them in education. Partners provide memorable experiences for pupils within the curriculum and enable the school to provide an extensive programme of extra-curricular activities which would not otherwise be possible. Links with community groups, some of whom use the school's facilities, are strong and have a significant impact on pupils' personal development. The school is a cohesive and harmonious community and makes a good contribution to community cohesion locally. However, leaders have identified that pupils do not have enough

direct contact with their counterparts from contrasting communities within the United Kingdom or overseas in order to bring alive for them the diversity of modern society and to prepare them more fully to take their places as global citizens.

The areas for improvement noted at the last inspection have been addressed effectively. Subject leaders play a significant role in monitoring their areas of responsibility, and the headteacher, deputy headteacher and staff now have a sharp focus on the school's strengths and areas for development. The level of challenge offered to exceptionally able pupils has been strengthened. Leaders are not complacent, however, and are keen to offer greater challenge to all pupils so that more of them make exceptional progress in English and mathematics as they move up the school. The school has good capacity to improve further.

Through her leadership we have moved into wonderful new premises, established flourishing links with the community and achieved the recognition through Ofsted of the supportive environment that puts the care of children at the very heart of the education process at Clarborough. Anna - we thank you.

On behalf of the Governing Body, I am delighted to be able to inform you that Mr Richard Bunn has been appointed as the permanent full-time Head Teacher of Clarborough Primary School. We are confident that he will build on the solid foundation of care, guidance and support for both students and staff that has always been at the heart of everything that the school stands for. Mr Bunn is looking forward to working with staff and parents/carers to further build on the successes that were recognised in the recent Ofsted inspection. The Governors are looking forward to supporting the School under his leadership.

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

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## **News from your MEP**

Climate Change The latest conference of the United Nations at Durban has ended with too little agreement, while last year world emissions rose by another 6%. The parliament's delegation has not yet reported back to us but it will not be cheerful.

Cameron's "veto". Cameron made the simplest mistake in politics. To leave the negotiating table without the others following him. He returned to London to cheers but with absolutely nothing to show for it: no repatriated powers (and no hope of getting them now), and no protection for the City. It was not a veto, it was self-isolation.

It is his second profound mistake: last year he pulled his Tory MEPs out of their main centre-right alliance (into which Mrs Thatcher had placed them, she knowing where power lies). The Tories are now without any influence or leverage for Britain over EU legislation.

**Euro-zone crisis** The national governments stumble on, summit after summit, using the government-to-government route, and always failing to agree enough remedies. See <a href="http://euobserver.com/843/114698">http://euobserver.com/843/114698</a>

The European Parliament is exceedingly impatient with them. The EU decision-making method, already agreed in the treaties, is that the Commission makes the proposal, the Parliament and the Council together decide, each by majority voting, and there is the solution!

If the Euro-zone fails, it will be because each national government insists on holding onto its own sovereignty and is unwilling to take the necessary step to shared sovereignty towards the Union that was agreed sixty years ago. In other words, nationalism will have prevailed. It is in Britain's strong economic interest that the euro survives.

We British should not underestimate the total determination of the continentals not to let sixty years of work unwind and risk a return to hostile rivalries in Europe. The world has changed and European countries, all of us small now, have to work together to face up to the emerging giants, China, India, Brazil, etc

Croatia is to be the next member state of the EU.

#### Meanwhile, some good news.

1. Mine about removing phosphates from detergents was approved by the parliament by

631 to 18. The Council has to give similar approval (the latest count there is 25 states in favour, two against) then it is a law applying directly without national parliaments involvement. More details at

2. Another is about fruit-juices - whereby the practice of adding sugar is outlawed and the practice of adding other juices must be clearly stated on the label (for example, at present "strawberry juice" is mainly apple juice.) More details at

3. Thirdly, a single EU Patent is approaching. The national governments have edged closer to ending decades of deadlock to agree on a streamlined system for patents, a move that would help businesses in our flagging economy. The agreement will also establish a Unitary Patent Court. Once finalised, the agreement would be a rare example of the "enhanced cooperation" process, whereby a group of member states can push ahead on their own with new rules, despite the objections of a few. Italy and Spain have refused to back the creation of a single EU patent because the official languages for an EU patent will be only English, French and German. They want Italian and Spanish included too.

4. My long campaign to raise the level of awareness about the ever-growing activities of international criminal gangs and the need for a European FBI is recognised. The parliament will create a new committee in January, on Organised Crime, and I expect to be one of its members.

#### Finally...

1. A popular Greek socialist ex-MEP was wandering round the parliament last week. A few months ago he was phoned by the Greek Prime Minister, Papandreou, "please come back to Athens and be my Foreign Minister". Soon afterwards, the new technocratic government took power in Athens. Stavros, the ex-MEP and exminister, said to me "If you ever get a call to be your country's Foreign Minister, just say No"!

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#### Where Is The Well In Welham?

A few years ago your editor learned that the name Welham probably derived from an ancient well located near Bonemill Lane. So over now to Glyn and Jenny Whelan to explain.

According to several articles that I have managed to obtain it is here at our house, "Well House" in what is now Bonemill Lane (formerly Wellhouse Lane). Undoubtedly, the original part of the house is the Spa that was built by John Hutchinson in the early 1700's. As quoted by Arthur Mee in "The Kings England Nottinghamshire " in 1938 "Below the floor of a cottage on the lane to Welham is the once renowned well which gave that village its name. A flight of steps goes down to the water in a stone basin 12 feet square." I am sure that many of the residents aged over 40 and still living here will be able to confirm following the school outings that used to visit here.

John Piercy wrote in 1828 "The History of Retford in the County of Nottingham as follows "Welham, or the Hamlet of the Well, is supposed to have derived its name from a once celebrated spring (St Johns Well) near the place, which was formed into a large bath, and still remains entire; during the early part of last century, it was famous for many cures, but latterly it has lost much of its celebrity. The late John Hutchinson, Esq. erected a cottage adjoining and enclosed the bath, to reserve it from injury. Here was, until lately a feast, or fair, held annually on St John's day, to which the neighbouring villagers resorted to enjoy such rural sports as fancy might dictate. Cold baths like this were formerly regarded with superstitious reverence, being supposed to possess a sovereign remedy for agues, rheumatism, &c." (probably they were also welcome after the flights of fancy)

I would like to thank local historian Ross Parish for giving me the above references during his research visit. Other items that emerged during my research were that Arthur Robert Garland of Welham Hall purchased from the deceased estate of John Henry Hutchinson of Clarborough Hall acres 117.3.16 along with Well House Cottage and garden for the sum of £3200 on 16/10/1910. He then sold the cottage and garden to Fred Anderson on 5/11/1910 for £130. This was subsequently bought by the late Mr Eric Durham on 14/10/1955, later to be purchased by myself on 27/3/1975

Further articles in the Retford Times of 14/6/57 & 2/7/70 give much of the above information along with the other points of interest. The Domesday book refers to Wellun (at the spring), this changed to Wellum by 1166 and by the 16<sup>th</sup> century had become Wellom but in Chapman and Andres map of Nottinghamshire in 1775 was shown as Welham. By 1830 the spring had lost much of its popularity as railways became widespread opening up travel to the warmer if not more effective spas. The water was originally taken internally and indeed prior to mains water in 1938 served as the water source to the local farms and cottages. One such house was Hopfield Cottage where hops were grown for maltings. And they can still be found in the local hedgerows (including here at Well House).

The secret behind the power of the water is its very high mineral content as it soaks through the gypsum in Clarborough hills. It is drinkable, but only in small quantities, as it is very high in magnesium and sulphate (the predominate ingredients of Andrews Liver Salts). It is quite chalky to taste flat but is very pleasant to drink if aerated. Other tales we have been able to glean from locals are that the lane used to be virtually a tunnel as the hedgerows joined above. Also it is believed that a Vicar of Babworth died of a heart attack while taking the very cold water. We would very much appreciate any further information that any readers are able to give us.

The spring today is diverted round the house and can be seen pouring out into the dyke halfway down our garden. It is still very prolific at several gallons per minute which does not reduce even in the driest of summers.

# Alternative Energy 3

Moving on to water power, we have many rivers in Britain where small scale hydro-electric schemes, sufficient for small villages and towns, could be installed. Places like the Lake District, Yorkshire Dales etc. have numerous rivers where careful building would not spoil the landscape. Tidal sources of power have been widely used in some countries and are well developed technologies. The big advantage with tidal is that it is absolutely guaranteed. As with other technologies, British governments have lagged way behind countries such as France in using tidal power. Wave power will take years of development; waves are extremely variable; from nothing to destructive - a real challenge.

Heat pumps utilise the heat available in the surroundings, almost no matter what the outside temperature. They are similar to the cooling system on a refrigerator – just feel the fins on the outside. It the system was reversed then the inside of the fridge would get warm! The energy used to operate the pump is less than the energy rise inside the building. Many theatres use this type of heating. The big advantage is that the system can be reversed and used to cool buildings. Water has a high "thermal capacity" (think how long it takes to boil a pan of water and how easily the metal handle of the saucepan gets hot) i.e. it contains a lot of energy. This can also be tapped from the sea and lakes etc. Ground source energy relies on the heat being generated in the earth. In some locations this is relatively close to the surface - not dangerous though! With the right technology this heat can be accessed and distributed through a locality. Leaders in this field include both Iceland and New

Nuclear energy is, perhaps, not the most popular at the moment bearing in mind the problems in Japan but the earthquake danger is irrelevant in this country. France generates the majority of its power by nuclear and, ironically considering the hysteria nuclear power can cause amongst the chattering classes in this country, we buy in considerable quantities of this nuclear generated power from France. To its credit, it is a carbon neutral power source and not dangerous in the way it is demonised by many.

So why are we still stuck with wind turbines. Cost, laziness and a lack of interest by successive governments!

Gross domestic product (GDP), the market value of all final goods and services from a nation in a given year, do not take into account differences in the cost of living in different countries, and the results can vary greatly from one year to another based on fluctuations in the exchange rates of the country's currency. The GDP dollar estimates presented here are calculated at market or government official exchange rates.
