### Tragic local World War I story

The following poignant letter provided by Annette Burton (nee Cobb) regarding her grandfather sheds some light on one of the war graves in St.John the Baptist church:

I beg to certify the Gunner William John Cobb, No.96,153, served overseas in my section of the 15<sup>th</sup> Battery, RFA (Royal Field Artillery) from May 1917 to April 1919.

To my own personal knowledge he suffered during the whole of that period from the effects of gas poisoning, but with a high sense of honour and much gallantry, persistently refused to report himself as a casualty. I have frequently seen him spitting blood as a result of his being caught in a gas shelled area and remember distinctly that on questioning him about it he replied that he had "always done since he was gassed". On one occasion, subsequent to a heavy gas bombardment by the enemy at the time of an attack on our lines in the Arras sector in June 1918, he was seized with a violent burst of bleeding apparently from the lungs. I personally conducted him to the dressing station at Blangy and handed him over to the medical officer in charge, who stated that he was suffering from gas poisoning. In less than a week's time he returned to the battery and said he had been at the C.C.J. at Aubigny and had left as he "felt alright" - again taking up duty with the guns.

It is my impression that when Gunner Cobb was a casualty in fact, at a time previous to his joining my battery he was then a 'gas casualty' and treated in hospital in the U.K. as such.

There is no doubt whatsoever in my mind that Gunner Cobb's fatal illness was the direct result of his suffering from cronic (sic) gas poisoning acquired during his service in France and further, that his steadfast devotion to duty, in spite of his disability, and his continual refusal to report himself a casualty while able to carry on, contributed largely to his actually laying down his life for his country. He was certainly one of the finest and most courageous soldiers I ever knew.

William John was just 25 years old when he died in 1921. He left behind a widow, Edith and a son George Cobb who was then just 9 months old. This same

George subsequently served in the Second World War and was a Japanese prisoner of war for 4 years before being released.

The R.F.A. was founded in 1716, its motto, UBIQUE, surmounting the gun, means 'Everywhere' and QUO FAS ET GLORIA DUCUNT, below the gun, means 'Where Right and Glory Lead'.

Ongoing research by Annette in association

with Retford Library's Family and Local History Group is aiming to 'flesh out' the story of the short life of William John Cobb. To date the only fairly firm result is a GRO death reference for the **March quarter**, **1921**:

Cobb William J 25yrs E.Retford 7b, 7


which agrees with a Retford Times report of his funeral.

A chemical note: it is likely that William Cobb suffered the effects of phosgene (COCl<sub>2</sub>) poisoning. This was the most common gas used in WW1, attacking exposed surfaces and the lungs but often not killing immediately.

# Clarborough student gives her support to the CAL Campaign ELIZABETHAN

Elizabethan Academy student, Vicky Booth, was determined to make a difference when her friend, Callum, tragically lost his life in a cycling accident last year.

Vicky joined forces with her fellow Elizabethan Academy student counsellors and Callum's family to form the CAL (Cycle Awareness Logic) Campaign. They aim to make students who cycle to the academy aware of safe cycling and to aid this they have produced a Six Point Cycle Code.

Students at The Elizabethan were asked to design a logo for the campaign, using Callum's favourite colours, red and yellow, which are symbolic of his passion for Liverpool FC. The winning logo now fronts the campaign and has been printed on the T-shirts, which the campaigners now wear to promote CAL.



The campaign was launched in January with the support of Retford Police, Retford Fire Service, The Retford Times, Halfords of Worksop and Councillor Ian Campbell, who is also passionate about making our roads safer for cyclists and helped to kick-start the

campaign's fund raising by donating a £250 community grant. This combined with the money raised by students through various fund-raising events, has taken the total for the campaign to over £1000.

Vicky said "We are so proud of what we have achieved so far. We have worked hard on this campaign, but it has all been worth it, in memory of Callum. Our aim is to make sure nobody else has to go through what we've had to go through, this past year. The next step for the campaigners will be to work with primary schools to promote safe cycling and help to keep children safe on the road."

### Liz Yates County Councillor



Although there are one or two ongoing issues, such as the proposed 40mph speed limit on Tiln Lane/Smeath Road (Lane), which as I write I am waiting for a response from the County Council officers, the main topic at the moment is around coal bed methane gas and shale gas extraction.

This is something that has made a big impact on some of our communities, with people's opinions being very much divided. We live in a democracy and people have a right to demonstrate and that is how it should be, people also have a right to an opinion and whether it is against or for this new technology, I hope those views are respected. The extraction of shale gas uses the method of 'fracking' where the shale under the ground is fractured and let us hope that if this does come to the district, that is all that is fractured and not the communities themselves. I will try and explain what has been happening so far.

A planning permission for test drilling a bore hole to obtain samples from the coal bed deep in the ground, was granted in 2009 at a site near Daneshill Lakes. This had an extension to that permission in 2012 for a further three years. Early this year Dart Energy, who have a

licence to carry out this process are now about to start drilling. This should take 4/6 weeks when they will vacate the site which will be returned to its previous state.

If the samples prove it is viable to extract the methane, the process of obtaining a licence, permits, clearance from the HSE and a planning permission from the County Council, with a final permit from the Department of Energy and Climate Change, would start all over again. The same procedure would have to be followed for 'fracking' if a company wished to do this. We have all heard that Central Government is becoming very concerned about a looming energy shortage and they are supportive of gas extraction from the ground, saving that renewable energy would not meet the shortfall that is expected to occur. This has led to several anti-fracking groups starting up around the country who have the support of many residents. Equally, many residents also support gas extraction for many reasons. My position is that I will support any resident by way of advice on the procedure, whether they are for or against.

While this is happening we have also seen a number of wind-farm applications and solar farms – none in early autumn last year but now approximately eight, either in place, going through the planning process or proposed for the near future.

I am more than happy to talk to anyone who has concerns or questions about any of the above. I am briefed very regularly by officers at the County Council with any developments, but I am not an expert on the matter. If you have a question I can't answer I will get an officer to contact you.

### Neighbourhood Plan – Good News 1

The Public Meeting held in the Village Hall on 17 March attracted about 40 visitors. Light refreshments were available and the Steering Group were pleasantly surprised at the length of time people stayed to consider and express their likes and dislikes about the villages and to put down their thoughts on the issues which should be included in the Plan. A large display outlined the process of a Neighbourhood Plan which is laid down by law. The display laid out the advantages to the villages of having a Plan. Members of the Steering Group were on hand to discuss those issues visitors thought should be included in a Plan and those visitors were given the opportunity to record their views. An outside observer considered the evening to be a great success.

The comments from this and the other 19 meetings will be analysed to inform the basic issues within a Draft Plan.

### Care.data plans on hold

NHS England's 'Care.Data' scheme was about to commence in March, which meant that data about you held by your GP would be released to the Health and Social Care Information Centre to be joined up with hospital data about you, unless you opted out.

Healthwatch Nottinghamshire was one of a number of local Healthwatch to report concerns to Healthwatch England about the lack of clear and understandable information that had been made available about the scheme and what the data would be used for. Healthwatch England took our comments on board and publicly called for NHS England to delay the scheme by 6 months.

We are pleased that on the back of this, NHS England agreed to delay the scheme for 6 months. This is a big win for the Healthwatch network and a great example of what impact Healthwatch can have on a national level. We hope that Healthwatch England will continue to work with NHS England to ensure that improved communications are completed over the spring so that the scheme can go ahead later in the year. ### Dave Airey's latest Police Report

Contrary to what we might believe from the tabloid press, anti-social behaviour is pretty rare and becoming even rarer in our neck of the woods. To quote Dave:

...seven years ago there were 192 reported incidents across the beat area. This full year, up to 31/03/2014, there have been eighty two similar incidents reported across the beat area.

With the clocks moving forward by an hour, and the weather significantly improving, this is usually the signal for an increase in anti social behaviour across the division. In light of this, could I ask parents/guardians to be aware of where there children are during the evenings and in what kinds of activities they are involved.

On the flipside, I also ask residents to be tolerant – and, with that, I do appreciate that we all have different tolerance levels. Being tolerant does not mean that anti social behaviour has to be put up with. Anti-social behaviour can be described as any aggressive, intimidating or destructive activity that damages or destroys another person's quality of life. However, don't assume that all groups of young people are up to no good. Often calls about anti social behaviour are simply misjudgements of intentions. Most young persons are just looking for entertainment, not necessarily to cause alarm and harassment to their local community.

### ...and, promotion for Dave?

Well, actually no – even though this was written on 1<sup>st</sup> April. I am sure Dave won't object to us using this space to provide the Home Office with a window into Clarborough & Welham. If readers visit our community website (www.clarborough-welham.org.uk) and go to the Law and Order ► National policies pages, you will be able to read Mary Calam's news each month and follow the links embedded in her article for much more background information. For now, here is her latest article:

On 6 March, Mark Ellison QC's independent review into possible police corruption in the original Stephen Lawrence murder investigation and of deployment of undercover officers against the Lawrence family was published. The Home Secretary commissioned Mark Ellis to carry out this review in 2012. In her statement to parliament, the Home Secretary said the report's findings "are profoundly shocking and will be of grave concern to everyone in the House and beyond." She announced there will be a judge-led public inquiry to investigate undercover policing and the work of the Metropolitan

Police's special demonstration squad (SDS). This inquiry will start after the conclusion of the criminal investigation and Mark Ellison's further work to identify possible miscarriages of justice. The Home Secretary also stressed how important it is that public trust and confidence in the police is maintained, and mentioned some of the specific measures that have been taken, such as the College of Policing's



Code of Ethics, the expansion of the Independent Police Complaints Commission and an HM Inspectorate of Constabulary review of anti-corruption capability of police forces. You can read the Home Secretary's statement <a href="here">here</a>.

To coincide with International Women's Day on 8 March, the Home Secretary announced that two initiatives to tackle domestic violence and abuse – the Domestic Violence Disclosure Scheme (also known as Clare's Law) and Domestic Violence Protection Orders (DVPOs) – would be rolled out across all police forces in England and Wales. The announcement follows a 14-month pilot in 4 police force areas which provided more than 100 people with potentially life-saving information. Speaking about the schemes, the Home Secretary said: "Clare's Law and DVPOs are just two of a raft of measures we have introduced to hand control back to the victim by ensuring they can make informed decisions about their relationship." At 30mph we are covering some 44 feet per second. To stop our cars (on a dry road) we take a typical 9 metres of thinking and then another 14m to stop (6 car lengths). At 40mph these figures increase to 12m and 24m (9 car lengths). At 70mph the total stopping distance is 100 metres!

This highlights the risks of 'tail-gating'.

# From the depth to peaks of human behaviour – at Laxton

Hate, the inhuman treatment of others is the story told at the National Holocaust Centre at Laxton. However, a recent talk by Phil Lyon MBE, Director of the Centre, explored the manifestations of hate in our modern world too, whether it be in Ukraine, on football terraces or aimed at ethnic minorities or those with disabilities.

The National Holocaust Centre has a mission not only to remember the Nazis programmes of extermination and similar atrocities such as those in Rwanda 20 years ago but also to address the very real issues of hate within modern society. Standing up against hate is not easy – but civilisation depends on it! The centre works with many organisations, particularly schools and other young-people groups, to address these issues.

On 27<sup>th</sup> January, Prime Minister David Cameron launched a National Commission to investigate possible further measures for Holocaust remembrance and education in the UK. The National Commission is currently seeking evidence. ### Fernwood Trucks from West Burton Power Station

There have been a number of concerns expressed about the driving of Fernwood Transport vehicles travelling through the villages for some months now, both in terms of speed and 'tailgating'.

The Parish Council have received assurances from John Ward at West Burton power station that the station will not tolerate bad driving. In addition, these HGV's should, normally, only be driving towards Retford through the villages and not from Retford.

If villagers have a concern about the speed, behaviour or direction of these HGVs then it is essential that the registration number of the vehicle is noted. Alternatively, there is a number on the top of the drivers cab or a number on the rear of the trailer. Either of these are as good as the registration number as it allows the authorities at West Burton to positively identify the vehicle and, hence, the driver.

This information should be passed to Mr John Ward at West Burton on 01427 882 178, along with the time and date of the incident.

While this may all seem difficult, it is important as the driver risks a life ban from the Power Station site if reported but positive identification is, in fairness, required.

### Pear, Walnut & Goat's Cheese Quiche

### **Pastry**

- 100g (4oz) self-raising flour
- 50g (2oz) suet
- 2-3 tbsp cold water

### **Filling**

- 1 medium egg, beaten
- 6 tbsp milk
- 4 pears slightly under-ripe ('hard'), cored &
- 200g (8oz) goat's cheese, sliced
- 4-5 walnuts, chopped
- Salt & pepper to taste

### Method

Grease an 8 inch flan dish/tin.

Preheat oven to 200°C/400°F, Gas mark 6.

Make your pastry by mixing ingredients together with salt & pepper. Add sufficient cold water to make a firm but not sticky dough. Roll out to line your dish.

Arrange the pear slices in the lined dish.

Mix the egg and milk and season, then pour this mixture over the pears. Sprinkle with walnuts and then bake in the oven for about 10 minutes.

Remove from the oven and top with sliced goat's cheese before returning to the oven for 5 minutes.

### My Quest

My name is Pete Cox, I am Caretaker at Clarborough Primary School and Drum Major of The Harworth Corps of Drums.

My friend's, Paul, Stephen (Nobbie), Darren (Daz) and myself made a decision over a few beers in the beautiful city of Ypres one warm summer's evening 2011. We were waiting for the Last Post ceremony, and agreed



that we must do something special for the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the beginning of the Great War in 1914. A plan was developed that we would find everyone

who appeared on the Retford War Memorial. Once done, find where they had died, where their graves were or, if they were never found, which Memorial they appeared on and then finally visit every one of them and place a cross on each grave and a wreath on each memorial, in every theatre of operations. As a personal project I will be visiting all those killed from Clarborough, Hayton, Welham, Harworth, Clayworth and Mattersey Village's. I have been researching for the last 2 years and now we are ready to go. The plan started with our first trip of a one day run out to Ypres visiting about 30 graves and laying a wreath at Tyne Cot Memorial Wall and the Menin Gate. Ron Murray, an 80 years young Veteran. kindly agreed to lay the wreath's for us to get us started. This was done on March 8<sup>th</sup> 2014. After that we shall be visiting, Germany to find the Prisoners of War, the UK, Mons, Bethune, Arras, Loos, the Somme, Cambrai, the Marne and Gallipoli in Turkey. Finally we will return to Ypres to lay a second wreath at the Menin Gate on November 11<sup>th</sup> 2014.

My Corps of Drums will be playing at the Clarborough Festival on Sunday May 18<sup>th</sup>. I will be parked on the car park behind the Village hall all day. If there are any relatives of the men who made the supreme sacrifice during the Great War 1914-1918 from Clarborough, Welham, Hayton or Clayworth who would like to personally sign a cross so that I can take them and place them on the soldiers graves or memorials, then please contact me on that day and I will supply the Cross and even a pen to sign it with...

### Researching The Great War

With the centenary of the outbreak of World War One, the 'Great War', fast approaching it seems appropriate to look at some of the avenues available to those of us fired up to find out more about our relatives who were caught up in that terrible period.

First and foremost, we should look to the Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC) whose continuing care for all of those graves and memorials is a lasting tribute to the fallen. This includes two graves in our own Parish Church graveyard (see page 2 for more). CWGC's Roll of Honour is available online at <a href="https://www.cwgc.org">www.cwgc.org</a> where details of the 1,700,000 Commonwealth war dead from both World Wars are commemorated. A simple search by name can reveal anything from cemetery or memorial locations through basic personal details to extensive service and family information; searches are free.

At this stage it is worth taking a few moments to remind ourselves that all Nottinghamshire Libraries have free access to Ancestry.com's full suite of databases which include several that are particularly relevant to WW1. Foremost among these, for those that survived military service, a good starting point are service pension records. These provide a considerable breadth of information about individuals, their service history and aspects of their relationships (spouse, children, home address, etc) and extend into the 1920s.

For broader perspectives, a range of resources are available from the BBC's World War One Centenary coverage (<a href="www.bbc.co.uk/ww1">www.bbc.co.uk/ww1</a>) through <a href="www.firstworldwar.com">www.firstworldwar.com</a> and Wikipedia's World War 1 articles to <a href="www.1914-1918.net">www.1914-1918.net</a> 'The Long, Long Trail' to name but a few.

A separate line of research, and one that is easiest to follow when the unit is known (often recorded by CWGC), is to do an online search for that unit. Many have active historical societies even if the unit itself no longer exists. These often hold historical records that are available to researchers.

Finally, of course, there are local groups and societies that cater for anyone interested in the whole area of genealogy and these often contains individuals specialising in military topics. So, in conclusion, don't forget your own local group – Retford Library's Family and Local History Group; see page 12 for more.

### European Parliamentary elections on 22<sup>nd</sup> May – make sure you have your say! Here candidates speak

Editorial Note: Without wishing to influence individual reader's decisions in the forthcoming elections, it has to be said that the single most consistent support that we have received in recent years has come from Bill Newton Dunn (Lib Dem) whose monthly Reports from the European Parliament can be read on our community website. Bill's views and insights into the wider European scene are there for all to read and consider. He is up for re-election so have a look at our website − follow the links *Elected Reps* ► *MEP* for more.

The race to the 2014 European elections is now well under way. During the last couple of weeks debate has been hotting up, with Nigel Farage and Nick Clegg arguing over the UK's future with the EU. In the aftermath of these debates, and as both parties make their case for having won, it is important to remember that neither of these men can deliver real change in terms of the UK's controversial relationship with the EU.

Firstly, there are those parties who don't trust the British public to make up their own minds. The Liberal Democrats did at one stage and then reneged on that manifesto pledge from 2010 (not the first time they have done that on a headline manifesto commitment). It's also clear that no matter what happens in negotiations on the UK's future membership of the EU, the Lib Dems will want to stay in regardless. Labour's position continues to be vague, with their only commitment being to hold a future referendum should there be any change to the Treaties. Given that this commitment has already been cemented into UK law by a Conservative government, the Labour Party have nothing new to offer us. All we do know is they are committed to EU membership without change.

And then there is UKIP. They promise to bring the UK out of the EU. But they cannot deliver this. They don't have the power to give the people of the UK a referendum. Never mind take us out of the EU. Their lack of engagement in the European Parliament also shows that they won't fight for a better deal for the UK while we are still in the EU. Time and again their members fail to show for important committee votes on issues vital to the UK, only for us to lose by the tiniest of margins. Do we really want these people representing our great country on the international stage?

So let me be clear. Only the Conservatives can deliver a referendum on leaving the EU or staying in on a renegotiated deal. The Prime Minister outlined recently his priority areas for negotiating; stopping large immigration flows when new countries join the EU; ensuring that migrants travel for work and not benefits; a reduction in red tape for businesses as well as a renewed effort by the EU to establish free trade deals with Asian and North American markets; bringing back

powers to the UK such as in the area of criminal justice; and abolishing the principle of "ever closer union". The Conservatives offer real results, real reform and a real referendum.

### **Emma McClarkin Conservative MEP**

On Thursday 22<sup>nd</sup> May you have the opportunity to elect Members of the European Parliament to represent the East Midlands, which includes Clarborough, Welham. Labour is focussed on the issues that matter to families in Clarborough and Welham who are worried about the cost of living crisis, rising energy bills, the cost of the weekly shop, long hours and stagnant wages and opportunities for their children. Labour will work to protect the thousands of jobs in the area that depend on our trade with the European Union. We need growth and investment to get the economy moving. The uncertainty created by the Tory and UKIP position on Europe is causing real concern in the business community, putting jobs and investment at risk.

In the European Parliament Labour's MEPs, including your current Labour MEP Glenis Willmott, are standing up to the big energy companies, the banks and fighting to protect your rights at work. ### **Surviving Windows 8**

Anyone who has purchased – or considered purchasing – a computer over the past six months or more could not avoid the bad press received by Microsoft after the launch of Windows 8, their most recent operating system. With all of the major retailers telling us that they 'recommend Windows 8' it comes as a shock to discover that well respected reviewers are saying much the opposite!

Here, however, we will avoid mud slinging – and also discussions of the very real alternatives – and look at how to bring some sort of 'normality' to the situation. By normality, what we mean in this short article is 'like the Windows I am familiar with'.

Now don't misunderstand me, there is a lot in Windows 8 that has been speeded up, tidied up and enhanced, it is just the attempt to bridge the gap between touch-screen hand-held devices and laptop and desktop computers that has resulted in Microsoft largely falling between those two very different stools.

So, how can you get Windows 8 to behave more like Windows 7 or even earlier versions? Well, the best currently signposted solutions are:

- Make sure you buy a machine with Microsoft's update for Windows 8 – *version 8.1* already installed. Be warned that a recent check of several high profile 'high street' retailers still found 'old' Windows 8 on offer.
- 2. Join Clarborough & Welham IT Group where you will get hands-on support to get to grips with your new system; it's really not that difficult with someone on hard to guide you!
- 3. Alternatively, install Classic Shell from www.classicshell.net which is a free tool to reinstate the traditional Start

button menu as shown here.

It will be hosted by St. Augustine's primary school in Worksop on the afternoon of Friday 4<sup>th</sup> July, and I hope that many of you will be able to join me there – please contact my office for further information (contact details to be found at the end of this article). As well as a time of reflection on the past, this centenary year will I hope help us to consider how our veterans who are still with us are treated. I will play my own small


