Update

A lot has been going on in the Neighbourhood Plan in the last three months although it may not seem so on the outside.

School Car Parking

The issue of problems created for residents by cars parking in Hillview Crescent to drop-off or pick-up children arriving at or departing from Clarborough Primary School was raised in our consultations. Parking for school events is also a problem.

NCC do not encourage the provision of parking facilities for schools, believing that children should walk to school with parents. The reality of Clarborough Primary School is that a large number of pupils live out of the village and car delivery is the only option.

After detailed discussions with a member of NCC Highways Department an option of utilising the existing Village Hall car park was proposed. This will involve widening the access road to the VH car park in order to prevent traffic flow problems on Main Street. The NP Steering Group have drawn-up plans for this and these will be proposed to the Parish Council. The removal and/or relocation of a number of posts and signs near the entrance has also to be negotiated with service providers. This will not be a quick fix but it is in hand.

A new footpath should link the car park to the school.

All that is necessary when this is achieved is to persuade parents to use the better parking facilities.

BDC Land 1 - St John's Drive residents

At the meeting in November 2014, the Steering Group were asked if some of the land could be sold to residents of St John's Drive with houses backing on to the land in order to extend their gardens. This was eventually agreed with BDC under certain conditions. Residents were given these details and likely costs in early March.

Unfortunately there were insufficient residents who supported the idea in order to fulfill the BDC conditions and the sale will not now go ahead.

Detailed plans for the use of the land, along the lines proposed at the public meeting in November 2014, have now been drawn up by designers employed by BDC. The details of these plans will be circulated to all

residents and businesses and all will be given the opportunity to vote on the proposals. There will be a number of events organised by the Steering Group to publicise and explain the details of the plans.

Please take part in the public consultation on this issue – it is the most significant development for Clarborough in 40 years!

Draft Plan

The Neighbourhood Plan is a detailed document outlining plans for the Parish to 2028.

The Draft Plan is currently being drawn-up for the Steering Group by a qualified planner based on all the discussions which have been held by the Steering Group. The Draft Plan will then be put out to public discussion for a period of 6 weeks. This period is required by law. During that time a number of consultation events will be held around the village and everyone will be encouraged to participate in the discussions. This will be in the next few months.

Finance

We are pleased to be able to say that the Steering Group have recently received further funding to support the progress of the Plan. This is £10,000 from the Awards for All Big Lottery Fund. This ensures that no costs fall onto village residents or businesses.

Remember, it is Your Village, your Plan, your Future!

There will be public consultation on the Draft Plan. This will cover a period of 6 weeks as required by law. Details of events will be circulated throughout the Parish.

Online security – a cautionary tale

Some pupils have almost automatically offered what appear to be their parents' password when first encountering the new school situation.



In Search of the Fallen

Regular readers may recall Pete Cox's article in our Summer 2014 issue explaining his plans, along with a small group of friends, to locate and honour the graves or memorials of all those men from Clarborough, Welham, Hayton and Clayworth whose names appear on Retford's War Memorial. This project is coming to a conclusion and we will be serialising extracts from these researches that apply to men from Clarborough or Welham as close as practicable to the centenaries of each individual's death.

Sgt Edward Cashburn was the nephew of Mr Webster and Madame Benson and lived with them for quite a few years whilst working on their farm in Church Road. He was an esteemed member of the Church Choir and at times was the Organist. On the outbreak of War he volunteered and enlisted on August 25th 1914 with the Notts and Derby (Sherwood Foresters) Regiment. He went to Bolton Park. Grantham and through strict attention to his duties was soon promoted to the rank of Sergeant and then posted to D Company 9th Battalion Notts and Derbyshire Regiment with whom he sailed to the Dardenelles and Gallipoli.

Pte F Boothright of D Company 9th Bat had written to Sgt Cashburn's friends saying "it is with great regret I have to tell you of Sgt Ted Cashburn's Death on 25th August 1915". Exactly one year to the day of his enlistment. He was calling to a badly wounded soldier who had laid between the firing lines for three days and was trying to encourage him to crawl to his trench when he was shot through the Brain. He had heard him moaning and was talking and directing him and as he looked over the parapet of the Trench a sniper shot him clean through the head. He was 24 years of age and had a brother. Morris Cashburn, both were orphans and Sgt Cashburn has left all his personal property to his brother Morris.

His name appears on Helles Memorial to the missing commemorating 20,886 names on the Gallipoli Peninsula and we visited the Memorial in October 2014.


Mis-connected drains pollute our rivers

Following a recent scrutiny review which looked at flood resilience in the District, a surprising fact was highlighted that one in ten houses have mis-connected drains and could pollute local waterways and cause flooding. For most houses built after 1920, the waste water drains into a separate foul sewer taking it to a sewage treatment works for clean-up, allowing clean rainwater to drain to the surface water sewer and straight to a local river.

Sometimes builders, plumbers or householders wrongly connect pipes, which carry waste water from toilets, baths, showers, sinks, washing machines or dishwashers, to the surface water system instead of the foul sewerage system. The dirty waste water could then be draining straight into your local river. Similarly, if gutters and gulleys are wrongly connected, they will be sending clean rainwater into the foul water sewer, overwhelming it and causing flooding. This increases costs which impact on all our water bills.

It's the homeowner's responsibility to ensure there are no mis-connections at their property, so if you're buying a new home it's very important to make sure this is checked.

The **ConnectRight** campaign is asking local property owners to check their drainage connections and where there are mis-connections to take action to connect drains correctly. criminals from entering and troubling residents. Evidently one third of Bassetlaw's crimes are committed by criminals entering the area. Better communication between the Police and the Parish Councils was also recognised as being essential for sound progress. An innovative idea - not fully explained - was that of introducing a voluntary role of Parish Constable who would help local policing. This of course was used in the 19th century and was only phased out when the regular police force became more organised. Certainly the Police seem to have taken rural concerns quite seriously. Our local history book is now at the publishers and we hope to have it ready in July when a tea party is planned at the Village Hall to thank everyone for their help, encouragement (and patience!). Greg and his IT team are working on a website which the Heritage Lottery wanted as part of our project.



FREE family history software

At Retford Library's twice monthly Family History sessions, the topic *which online resources should I use?* Often crops up.

Now, the group's primary reason for existing is to provide members with free access to Ancestry.com's resources. These are almost certainly the most comprehensive databases of information for genealogists **but** a private subscription sets individuals back more than £150 so access to them for nothing (just holding a Library Card) is a big draw to the group.

However, when working at home these resources are obviously not available, so where should anyone getting to grips with their family history start? My advice is to use two sources that are **absolutely free**:

- www.freebmd.org.uk
- www.familysearch.org

The former provides **free** indexes to birth, marriage and death certificates (hence 'bmd') from 1837 to around the mid-1960. The site is a volunteer organisation and the indexes provide the data needed to order copies of certificates, either from the GRO (General Register Office) or local Register Offices – both currently costing £9.25 each. Don't get pulled into some online organisation which promise to 'do it for you' but then demand £20-30 or more!

Familysearch is the online presence of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. This organisation has collected together one of the largest databases of genealogy information and makes it available free of charge both online and through a wide network of worldwide Family History Centres (over 100 in the UK alone). Familysearch is particularly useful as it has probably the largest collection of Parish Register data.

Family search has one more 'winner' up its sleeve – a free software application for storing all of your hard-won family history information on your laptop of computer. Called *Legacy Family Tree* is an ideal, free, way to structure your researches and keep all your records in an easily accessible form – no piles of paper! For more on these topics as well as introductions to archive techniques (microfilm and microfiche readers) and paper records such as Electoral Registers, Parish Registers, Newspaper archives, historical photos and maps plus lots more, why not come along to one of our *free* Monday sessions – 17:00-19;00?

These are generally held on the second and fourth Monday of each month (except August and Bank Holidays) and are **free of charge** but contact the library for latest information on **(01777) 708 724**.

Further opportunities are provided at mopnthly **Local** and **Family History Drop-in Surgeries** at Retford Library.

Why not drop in for a chat and find out more about the library's local and family history resources that could help with your research?

This drop-in session is **free** and **no booking is** required.

Know it all?

No, not name calling, but some thoughts for pupils, students and parents on the brink of this year's summer examination season!

Recent scientific studies have thrown more light on preparation for exams and, more widely, the whole business of learning. *New Scientist* 28th March, 2015 explored in some detail those techniques that have been *proven* to aid learning – and those that don't! This short summary is intended to offer some quick-fix approaches to the last-minute demands on students as examinations loom.

Firstly, however, some techniques that are pretty certain **not** to work. These include such time-worn techniques as reading and re-reading important texts, copying your notes, summarising the material along with a number of keyword and mental imagery approaches.

So, what has been proven to work? Well, what does seem to come through – and has been recognised by teachers themselves – is that you only really get to grips with your subject/topic when you try to explain it to someone else. As an ex-teacher, I can vouch for the reverse of this; you don't realise what you don't know, until you try to teach it!

So, how can those preparing for examination use this to drive their own learning? Suggestions include such approaches as small group work, try to explain your chosen topic to friends, or why not use your parent's as audience/critics? This family-based approach could also provide a good way to pull parents into your tasks so that they can be supportive. Try to get them to understand your current revision topic by explaining it to them. What seems really to consolidate learning is being quizzed about what you've just taught. So, after explaining your topic, get your parents to ask you to clarify certain points.

What about timing? Research seems to confirm what we have really known for ages – late-night work is generally unproductive and can actually have significant negative effect if it leads to tiredness the following day. Whether morning or afternoon/evening study works best seems a much more personal matter

Sleep is a time in which the brain turns the day's learning into memories - our knowledge. So a good sleep pattern is vital and may explain why younger people often learn better than older people who generally sleep less.

Hopefully, these few examples of modern research will help modern students – good luck!

Law School

Dave Airey's monthly Reports (see our website for full Reports) continue to show that our area has generally low crime rates but, having said that, there are some trends that should concern us. The most notable one concerns vehicle crimes. Dave explains...



On this beat area and, indeed, across East Bassetlaw there has been an increasing amount of vehicle crime reported which could potentially have been avoided.

For many people - after their home – their car is their second most expensive single purchase yet it is amazing how many people fail to look after their vehicle. Vehicle thefts, including bicycles and motorcycles, are crimes of opportunity, yet around one fifth of all drivers admit they regularly leave their cars unlocked.

To outwit the thief, there are four golden rules:

- Always keep your car locked. This includes the sunroof and windows, even if you are only leaving it for a few seconds that is all the time it takes for a criminal to steal your car or your belongings.
- Don't leave anything in your car, whether it is valuable or not, particularly when it is parked overnight. More than sixty per cent of thefts of and from vehicles occur when they are parked outside the home. If you must leave items in your vehicle, lock them in the boot or out of sight and be particularly careful with expensive stereo units, mobile phones and sat navs.
- Park with care. Park in busy, well lit areas near CCTV cameras or in Police approved "ParkMark" car parks.
 Always chain bikes, motorcycles and scooters to something fixed, like a security rail or post
- Keep your car secure: Never leave the keys in the ignition, not even when you are filling up or paying for petrol. Don't leave anything on display, and wipe any suction marks off your windscreen as they alert a thief to the presence of valuable items in your car.

Never leave vehicle documents or spare keys in your car and, if your car doesn't have one already, consider fitting an approved alarm or immobilizer, or a steering lock on an older vehicle. If you own a high value or performance vehicle, consider fitting a tracking device.

Have your cars registration number etched on all glass surfaces, including the headlamps, and ensure that your number plates are secured properly to prevent theft of the same. If your number plates are stolen, report this to the Police.

Even when you are driving, keep doors and windows locked and bags and mobile phones out ofview. A thief can lean in and snatch them in the time it takes for a red light to change to green.

Keeping your motorcycles secure: Put a steering lock on and use a strong steel cable or D-lock to attach your bike to security rails or a ground anchor. Consider a professionally fitted combined alarm and immobilizer. If you have a garage – use it, or at least cover your

motorcycle when you are not using it.
Keeping your bicycle secure: Buy a good quality lock that can withstand attack. Two locks will double your security, and lock your bike to an immovable object.
Keep your bike secure at home. Keep it in the garage or shed and lock it up even when it is in there.
When locking it to a fence or post, make sure it cannot simply be lifted off and get your bike frame security marked with your name and postcode.
The more difficult you can make life for a thief the better, and the more likely you are to retain

3D printing isn't just a hobby!

Many readers will have been aware for quite a while now that so-called 3D printers have become available to enthusiasts who have been making all sorts of plastic bits-and-pieces. Some have used their printer to make replacement parts – control knobs for washing machines or a broken knob on a kettle lid.

How many know, however, how fast this revolutionary technique is developing and how great will be its impact on industry at large? The technique, variously known as additive technology, has exploded such that techniques are now available to not only print plastics but materials as varied as clothing 'fabrics', glass and concrete. However, probably the most remarkable example of this technology is Rolls-Royce prototyping of additive technology. Incorporated into its Trent XWB-97 engine, the UK aerospace manufacturer and defence contractor has 3D printed a titanium structure that measures 1.5m in diameter and 0.5m-thick. This front bearing housing contains 48 aerofoils and was manufactured using Arcam's electron beam melting technology, as the result of research performed with University of Sheffield and the UK's Manufacturing Technology Centre. The technology is beginning to change the repair and spare parts industries because parts are now becoming available 'on demand' – no need for vast stores of spare parts.

Men's Health 2 - AAA

No, not an advance motoring organization – but Abdominal Aortic Aneurism. **Abdominal** – that bit of your body between the bottom of your ribs and your pelvis.

Aortic – the aorta is the main artery, which takes the blood from the heart to the rest of the body. That blood is under pressure and this can be felt as pulses in other arteries when they go over bones and therefore not as deep in the body as they usually are.

Aneurism – a thin section in an artery, which is vulnerable to splitting due to the pressure of the blood.

So an AAA is a thin part of your main artery, which is deep in your abdomen. Why is it a problem? Because, being thin and weak, it may 'balloon' as it fills with blood. Worse, this balloon may burst and so release blood into the abdomen. If this happens there is an 80% likelihood of death. Around 6000 people die each year from AAA!

The test is simple, an ultrasound scan, much like that which pregnant women undergo, which is non-invasive, pain-free and very short. It usually takes between 5-10 minutes. Results are given there and then. If you have one it may never need treatment but you would be monitored as a precaution.

A friend of mine had the test, he was clear. Talking to a group of friends he managed to persuade some of the group to have the scan. All clear. Except one, who had a different problem identified and eventually rectified as it was a serious condition.

Why is offered to men? 1 in 25 men have an AAA and men are 6 times more likely to have one than are women.

Fairtrade for Clarborough, Welham & Bassetlaw

Many Clarborough residents will be aware that Fairtrade Fortnight was celebrated in February-March this year. The emphasis for 2015 was to highlight the producers who grow the products we love and share their stories. This was to remind ourselves of the dramatic difference Fairtrade makes and how much it is still needed. Recent research shows that while 78% of the UK public recognise the FAIRTRADE Mark, over half still don't actively choose Fairtrade products. When asked, people say this is mostly because they don't know what Fairtrade does or don't believe buying it has any benefitsSo how many Clarborough residents are clear about the benefits of Fairtrade? The FAIRTRADE Mark means that the Fairtrade ingredients in the product have been produced by small-scale farmer organisations or plantations that meet Fairtrade social, economic and environmental standards. The standards include:

- protection of workers' rights and the environment,
- payment of the Fairtrade Minimum Price
- an additional Fairtrade Premium to invest in business or community projects.

If you are a tea drinker, here's an example of what your purchase of Fairtrade tea could mean.

Fyson Tchale is a 79 year old tea farmer in Malawi. Fyson is married with eight children and 33 grandchildren. The 79-year-old started growing tea as a smallholder farmer in 1964. The benefits of Fairtrade for Fyson range from being able to drink safe water from a community water tap rather than unprotected wells, to a fund for maize which he can buy at a 30% lower price than the market offers – both funded by the Fairtrade Premium. His grandchildren are schooled in modern blocks and sit at desks also paid for by the Fairtrade Premium. In the future, Fyson would like to grow more tea and see piped water taps in every household. It will be easier for him if he can sell more tea with the Fairtrade mark.

Why tea farmers still need you to purchase Fairtrade:

- Tea producers in the Fairtrade system sell on average under 9% of their product on Fairtrade terms
- Only around 7% of tea sold in the UK is Fairtrade
- Tea production relies on established rainfall patterns. In recent years weather patterns have become increasingly unpredictable, linked to deforestation and climate change, and affecting producers' livelihoods.
- More tea sales mean more benefits for the 285,900 tea farmers and workers in the Fairtrade system, and the opportunity for more farmers and workers to start selling on Fairtrade terms.

So here's a challenge for Clarborough residents. You can play a part in convincing more shoppers and businesses to choose products that change lives - there are over 4,500 Fairtrade products from coffee and tea to flowers and gold, so when you shop, look for the FAIRTRADE Mark during your next shop.
