Rights-of-Way Updates

There are many footpath issues which are currently being addressed with a view to ensuring we continue to have an excellent Public Rights of Way network. I hold regular meetings with the Countryside Access Team at Nottingham County Council to discuss these matters and to agree corrective actions.

Though I try to walk along all the Public Rights of Way within the parish on a regular basis to ensure all is well, I am grateful to the members of the public who draw my attention to items I may have missed. Please let me know if you see overgrown crops on paths, missing/hidden way markers etc or any areas for improvement and I will action accordingly.

I have been asked to clarify the responsibilities of both landowners and walkers in respect of the usage of Public Rights of Way, in particular footpaths. Without getting too legalistic, here is a rough guide:

Most of the Public Rights of Ways in Clarborough cross private land. These paths are generally well waymarked and, where they cross arable land which has been ploughed or has crops growing, the line of the path should be defined by wheel tracks or spraying. It is the landowners' responsibility to mark out the correct line of the path and to keep stiles in good repair.

Walkers (and dogs) must keep to the defined line of the path otherwise they are trespassing. Landowners can ask anyone who strays from the defined line of the path to return to the correct line. It is an offence for anyone to refuse this request or to cause damage.

Dogs do not have to be on leads, but 'must be under control' at all times. It is only common sense to keep a dog

on a lead when crossing a field containing sheep, horses, cows or other livestock.

One of the biggest issues for this parish (and indeed nationwide) is dog fouling. It is an offence not to clean up after dog fouling and the dog walker must either deposit the poo bag in bins provided (usually painted red) or take the package home for disposal.

I hope this clarifies a few points, but for further reading see **www.environmentlaw.org.uk**

Do take advantage of our footpaths as an excellent form of recreation as winter approaches.

Retford Christmas Market and Christmas Lights Switch-On

Retford Business Forum's Christmas Market Team is busy putting the final touches to this year's Retford Christmas Market/Christmas Lights Switch-On which will be **held on Sunday 26th November 2017**, from 09:00 to 18:00, in and around the market square in Retford.

As well as the usual star guest – Santa - brought to us by Retford Lions, an open-air church service, fireworks, and "Santa's little helper" and Jo Jingles switching the lights on, there will be many new attractions this year. Details are currently being worked out, but here is the latest list:

- Pilgrims Fun Run 5k, so great for everyone it's like a Santa run, but reflecting the famous local people who became and supported the Mayflower Pilgrims. Watch out for separate announcements about the Pilgrims art exhibition at Babworth church on the weekend 18th and 19th; the lantern parade, Illuminate Civic Service and '400' on 21st; as well as the Thanksgiving Dinner at Spencer's on the Square on 23rd November.
- Prima Party and Junk Yard Circus will be entertaining old and young in the Buttermarket with appearances from singing princesses Elsa, Belle, Aurora and Merida as well as mascots Chase, Marshal, Lego Batman, Kevin the Minion, Spiderman, Superman Man of Steel, and Batman. There will be a photo booth with timetabled appearances for some of the characters plus a clown balloon twister, face painter, magician, and for the much smaller visitors, a soft play area.
- Bassetlaw Museum will be open with children's Victorian decoration-making; the Grove will have an even bigger Star Festival; and St Swithun's is holding a Christmas Tree Festival, hoping for a 100+ trees. The Hub will be open with creative activities and the Pilgrims Centre, and there will be a car display on Grove St. A collect-the-stamp trail will be promoted around these attractions with a free prize draw for completed entries.
- Retford Business Forum (RBF) has delivered the Christmas Market and Lights Switch-on for the last three years, supported by Bassetlaw District Council, local businesses and societies, and in 2016, the Big Lottery. It is a community event run for the people of Retford and the surrounding villages, and visitors have been welcomed from Doncaster, Gainsborough, Harworth, Lincoln, Mansfield, Newark, Nottingham, Rotherham, Sheffield, Tuxford, Worksop...... and far beyond.
- The support of local businesses is vital to the success of the event and the team is currently seeking sponsorship for this year's event – to make it bigger and better than ever!

Changing your e-mail address

E-mail accounts that are linked to your telephone and internet service provider (ISP) have some serious disadvantages. Firstly, they are invariably restricted to use from your home, so if you move around a lot, your e-mail service can be pretty limiting.


Also, if your e-mail is is tied to your Internet Service Provider (ISP) / telephone line then you will find it difficult to switch to a better/cheaper provider. Also, your e-mail could be running on software such as Windows Live Mail or Outlook that are no longer being supported. Free webmail services are available giving you more flexibility – and often greater usability.

For example, Gmail is one of the most popular webmail systems and, like the rest, is free. Just do a Google search for **gmail**. Go to the main page and look for the (usually) red box containing **Create an Account**. This takes you through the basics of creating your new e-mail account – all at no cost! Further, you can create several accounts so that you can separate, for instance, personal and business matters. Again, at no cost.

Once your webmail account is created, you can access it anywhere you have internet access and independent of your telephone service provider – so you can hunt around for a better deal.

Retford **Heritage Trail**



Retford's new *Heritage Trail Guide* was launched at Bassetlaw Museum on Heritage Day in September 2017, attended by the Chairman of Bassetlaw Council Madelaine Richardson and the Mayor Helen Richards. The Guide is now available at Retford Hub, Bassetlaw Museum, Retford Library and Bookworm. Beautifully illustrated with watercolours by local artist Andy Massey, it includes a wealth of information presented in a user friendly way, with an easy to read map and two suggested walks that will take in many aspects relating to Retford's heritage. The Guide is free, but donations are always welcome!

The Guide was funded by Retford Civic Society (helped by the Rotary Club of Retford's Percy Law Trust) in partnership with Bassetlaw District Council, and the Museum Development East Midlands supported by the Arts Council England.'

Fireworks Regulations

It is worth reminding everyone that UK Law has a set of very specific requirements as far as sale, possession and use of fireworks is concerned. The following is taken from our PCSO Dave Airey's September report. Full versions of his recent reports can be found on our community website's *Law & Order* ► *Local Police Reports* page. The Fireworks Act 2003 put in place the Firework Regulations 2004. Regulation 4 makes it an offence for any person under the age of 18 to possess any firework in a public place or any place to where the public have access (except indoor fireworks such as cap, cracker snap, novelty match, party popper, serpent, sparkler or throw down).

Regulation 5 prohibits any person from possessing a category 4 firework, whether in a public place or not. Regulation 7 creates a curfew on the use of fireworks between the hours of 23:00 and 07:00 with the following exceptions:

- 1. Chinese New Year 01:00 (the following day) to 07:00.
- 2. 5th November 12 midnight to 07:00.
- 3. Diwali 01:00 (the following day) to 07:00.
- 4. 31st December 01:00 (the following day) to 07:00.

Regulation 9 states that no person will supply fireworks to the general public outside the following periods, unless they hold the appropriate license:

- 4 days before and including the day of Diwali.
- 4 days before and including the day of the Chinese New Year.
- 6 days before the 31st December.
- 3 weeks before and 5 days after the 5th November.



Aladdin - now there's a story!

Aladdin is one of the best-known tales in *The Book of One Thousand and One Nights also known as The Arabian Nights* although not part of the original Arabic text.

The Thousand and One Nights seems to have origins from a lost Persian book of fairy-tales called Hazar Afsanab (A Thousand Tales) translated into Arabic around 850 A.D. The common factor between this lost text and our current one is structure created by the Prologue or Frame Story: Its scene is Central Asia (India and China) where King Shahryar, after discovering that during his absences his wife has been regularly unfaithful, kills her and those with whom she has betrayed him. Then, loathing all womankind, he marries and kills a new wife each day until no more candidates can be found. His Vizier, however, has two daughters, Shahrazad (Scheherazade) and Dunyazad; and the elder, Shahrazad, having devised a scheme to save herself and others, insists that her father give her in marriage to the king. Each evening she tells a story, leaving it incomplete and promising to finish it the following night. The stories are so entertaining, and the king so eager to hear the end, that he puts off her execution from day to day and finally abandons his cruel plan. The Thousand and One Nights represent the stories told by Shahrazad each evening.

These stories themselves are sometimes stacked rather like Russian dolls and were doubtless added into the overall framework as successive *rawis* (Arabic professional story-tellers) added material – the original 'thousand' was just an indication of 'lots' and not a specific total.

Aladdin itself did not appear in these earlier versions and only became part of the nowfamiliar Western-translation versions when Antoine Galland who heard it from a Syrian storyteller in 1709. Interestingly, the story opens with Aladdin described as son of an impoverished tailor living in a certain city in China, and indication of the breadth of original source of these stories.

Parish Council Flood Action

Flood prevention in the parish is mainly the responsibility of landowners, the County Council and the District Council. The Parish Council (PC) is also taking a number of steps about flooding risks. These include:

- Contacting the District Council and the County Council to find out about their plans for reducing the risk of flooding.
- Understanding the work planned for Howbeck and when it will start.
- Seeking technical support for new ideas to mitigate flooding risk.
- Making sure 'riparian' landowners know their responsibilities.
- Contacting villagers who have homes which border Howbeck and...
- Contacting villagers whose home or land was flooded in 2007 and/or 2014.

The objective within the parish is to establish a group of villagers who will act as Flood Wardens and also look into new and different ways of reducing the risk of flooding..For more details, you can read the draft Flood Prevention and Flood Management Strategy posted on our Clarborough & Welham community website (www.clarborough-welham.org.uk) and go to Parish Council > Other Documents.

An initial meeting for those interested in the PC's actions will be arranged later in the year. The PC will put up posters and put details through letterboxes of houses in areas where flooding took place with details of the meeting.

The Hub supports local people through sales of their most beautiful and skilfully made items, unique one-offs at reasonable prices. But its more than that, tourists are now coming to the Hub, the word is spreading, Trip Advisor reviews are helping, Facebook is buoyant, coaches are stopping off, people are finding out about the hidden delights of Retford and the town is starting to see a 'renaissance'. Retford is becoming *the* place to shop and the Hub is *No1* and has been recently nominated for best attraction in North Notts.

November will be our busiest month yet, we have Carol Eason's exhibition in the Gallery, there are family art classes to create Christmas Decorations (date to be confirmed) and a craft fair on Sunday 26th. In addition the Mayflower Pilgrim Centre will be open supporting all the activities planned for the month.

Background information:

Retford Hub (North Notts Artisan and Tourist Information Centre)

Retford Hub is the only Tourist Information Centre in North Notts and 'flies the flag' for the area. Security leak of 700 million email addresses

This startling revelation became public early in September [Source; Which? Computing October 2017]. The addresses in some cases include passwords from various data hacks. To find if your email address is one of those go online to **www.haveibeenpwnd.com** and enter the appropriate email address – you won't be asked to enter any passwords or other details.

Fortunately this author found 'no need to worry' message for each of his e-mail accounts. However, several members of Clarborough & Welham IT Group did find their accounts listed!

The advice to them, and to anyone else similarly affected, is to change your password(s) immediately.

This probably provides a good opportunity to repeat some standard advice about passwords:

- a. Do not use the same password for more than one account.
- b. Change passwords at intervals.
- c. Do not store passwords on your computer.

With a number of passwords for different accounts (the author has over 80!) it is essential to keep a written record that is not stored on your computer and is kept in a secure location. The Nottingham Fire and Rescue Service have now announced that it will be holding a consultation into the proposed changes to Worksop Fire Station. I have met with the Chief Fire Officer to discuss these changes and have told him my concerns about the

reduction in the numbers of Firefighters and the public's safety. You can access the consultation by going on the following website www.notts-fire.gov.uk/nfrs-news/Pages/Fire-Authority-seeks-public-view-on-proposed-changes.aspx or you can contact me on 01909 506 200 for a paper copy.

Unfortunately, the Nottingham Fire and Rescue Service will not be holding public meetings and are hiding from Bassetlaw residents and their views on the changes to both Retford and Worksop fire stations. This blatant avoidance of the general public shows that the Nottingham Fire and Rescue service are running scared of the opposition to the reduction of firefighters and don't want to engage with the public on this matter. I have said before that these proposals are dangerous and will end up costing lives, so please make your voices heard by completing the online consultation and help to save our Fire Services in Bassetlaw.

I have been contacted by residents with concerns about flight paths to and from Robin Hood airport. The airport has now started their public consultation on proposed route changes for taking off and landing planes. These proposed changes are aimed at reducing the amount of noise that can be heard on the ground when aircraft take off or land. The airport is keen to make sure that the voices of affected communities are heard, so if this is a problem for you I encourage you to take part in the consultation to make sure your voice is present in the process. Additionally, the airport are holding drop in sessions every week until the deadline so you can voice your opinions on the proposed plans in person. The consultation and all the details are online and I will be promoting it on both Facebook and Twitter. 

By the time this edition reaches your letterboxes I will already be 6 months into the role; and how that time has flown. From the ordered business of Parish Council meetings, through a whirlwind of summer fetes, to the autumn hues of craft and produce shows, I am slowly getting to know you and the villages of Misterton Division so much better.

My roles at County Hall are the Children and Young People's Committee, and the Planning Committee; both of which touch many aspects of residents' lives. I am the NCC representative on both of the iGas Community Liaison Groups, in respect of the exploratory sites at Misson Springs and Tinker Lane, Torworth. The preparations and the scheduled works are being carefully monitored by the County Council and by other regulatory bodies, and I continue to meet residents involved in both of those groups as iGas prepare for exploratory drilling.

I have been meeting staff from across the vast range of Children's Services, and visiting some of the fantastic facilities that NCC runs. In July leaders from the Youth Service ran "Skatefest" in Kings Park at Retford, with help from young people volunteers from some of the Bassetlaw centres. In September I was lucky enough to visit the outdoor residential centres at Hagg Farm and St Michaels, Hathersage, where school groups are learning to enjoy activities away from the classroom or home. I had been hoping to meet the pupils from Clarborough School on my visit; but as the weather was so good and they were so engaged, I gather that they took the chance for a longer excursion, and I missed their return to base (see page 6).

I've advised the Parish Councils of two NCC public consultations in recent weeks: The Health & Wellbeing Strategy, and the School Term Dates. I will continue to keep Parishes informed and encourage residents' participation in all that interest you. We're about to embark on a recruitment drive for Foster Carers; and I would ask anyone who might consider fostering, to contact NCC to discuss joining the many carers who add so much to the lives of our children and young people.

At this time of year, as we head for Harvest and Remembrance and Christmas, I'm mindful that so much of what marks the pattern of our year is a recognition and celebration of the good things that we have: food, freedom and family; but not everyone is so fortunate. 

Bookworm is 25 in November!

Bookworm opened in November 1992, at the height of the 90s recession. Mortgage rates were sky-high, homes were falling into negative equity but for some reason we thought this was a good time to leave secure professional jobs and open a bookshop! We had no previous business experience, but with youth, enthusiasm and two infant children, we opened on Friday the 13th and hit the ground running. Our goal was to create a bookshop to be proud of.

Armed with cutting-edge technology in the form of a clunky second-hand microfiche reader, a fax machine and nextday delivery of books from wholesalers, we embarked on creating a reputation for an exemplary, speedy ordering service. This is still a core part of our business today. Two years after opening, the Net Book Agreement (which held the same price on a book wherever it was purchased) started to dissolve, making way for relentless discounting. We opened our shop thinking that customer service and quality of product was the most important element in running a successful business, but the powers that be were now saying it was all about price promotion. We knew that we couldn't compete with the supermarkets and chain stores, so we developed several niche areas (such as history and transport) and we added a few non-book products to create variety within the store.



At this time it was our loyal customers who were (and still are) our main reason for success and survival in a tough market place. Our customers value the presence of a bookshop in their town. They love to browse real books, see before they buy, or just spend a while in the ambience of a bookshop. After 25 years many customers are now true friends whom we can't thank enough for their support.

Five years ago we decide to introduce a second-hand/collectable book section. At first this was a very small area of just two bookcases, but after encouragement and appreciation shown by customers this section now accounts for about 15% of our shop with no reduction of new books - we have just had to be more creative with display space. Our second-hand books (like our new books) are selected for quality and are mostly reference books, especially military history, local history and transport. These subjects are also our strength in new



books, so they complement each other, and we now have returning customers from many miles away. Our selection of greeting cards, children's trading cards and Games Workshop miniatures also bring in customers who are not natural bookshop customers.

Publishing is something which quite a few independent bookshops have added to their services and Bookworm is no exception. We have published several local history books, poetry, a novel, the biography of a travelling cat and two cookery books, one of which became an unexpected bestseller - The Halogen Oven Cookbook has sold over 27,000 copies and is still selling.

Like all small-town bookshops, we are community-oriented and our links with schools and the wider community go back many years. We sometimes reflect on those years, but mostly we are forward-looking, and creative with a little bit of the unexpected.





Family History - civil registration

Readers of part 1 of these articles (Spring 2017) will recall that the **Births and Deaths Registration Act** of 1836 initiated the civil registration process by which all of our births, marriages and deaths are recorded by the state.

While it is forbidden for the state to expose these original documents to public view, it is possible to obtain printed copies if the index of the required certificate can be identitifed – and the appropriate fee (currently $\mathfrak{L}9.25$) be paid.

The GRO uses an extended filing system to manage all of these millions of certificates which can be viewed as hefty leather-bound (and sharp brass cornered!) books that can be viewed at the National Archives and several large city libraries or archives. Fortunately, however, an army of volunteers has been coying these indexes onto the internet for many years and has made their efforts free to users — this is the basis of the freebmd website (www.freebmd.org.uk).

It's worth noting the extremely useful – and wide content of another website that is commonly used in this sort of research – www.Ancestry.com. Ancestry contains much valuable, even essential, data that can include that in freebmd, but there is a catch – Ancestry demands a subscription that can run to more than £100 per year. However, we should also note that Ancestry's website is available, free of charge, in any Nottinghamshire library, provided you have a library card; just book a computer or come along to the, usually, twice-monthly Family and Local History Group at Retford Library on second and fourth Mondays of each month (except August) from 17:00 to 19:00.

However, to return to the freebmd website, let's explore a search for one Walter Tritchler, a family member born sometime in the 19th century.

Entering the website into your web browser – or a Google-type search for 'freebmd' and choosing the hit with the correct, green, website beneath it, leads to a homepage with a number of red subsections – search is at the extreme left. Click on **Search**.

The Search page has a large number of option but only a few are needed for most searches. These are:

Type: Choose either Births, Deaths, Marriages or, occasionally, All.

Surname: This and all other boxes are case insensitive. First name(s): Generally just the first although this is often a long-term trial and error option. William may have been entered as Wm, Bill or even with his middle forename! The other boxes on the left of the page can, initially, be ignored except for the Date range boxes. Enter the start and end years for your research and remember that Mar and Dec correspond to the first and fourth quarter of each year – you can narrow your search if you know roughly which quarter contains your target.


The right-hand side of the search page deals with **where** the event took place, remembering that this database covers England and Wales only..

If you have no concrete evidence for the location of your chosen event, click on **All Districts** at the top of the Districts box and **All Counties** at the top of the Counties

box.

With this data entered, run your eyes quickly over the full Search page to check for errors, then click on **Find** at the lower left-hand part of the page, just above the blue *Advanced Facilities* button.

This example was easy because the surname was



unusual. The above was the only 'find' that was identified between Mar 1880 and Dec 1890.

The person's surname and forename appear first followed by month – this month indicates the last month of each quarter of each year. The December quarter will contain all births from 1st October to 31st December. The other quarters are referred to by GRO as the Mar(ch), Jun(e) and Sep(tember) quarters with corresponding meanings. Walter Tritchler was actually born on 9th September – something only a copy of the certificate will reveal. In this case, his birth was registered in Northampton and the rest of the data is referred to as *Volume Number* (3b) and *Page Number* (48).

Quoting all of the above information to either the GRO or a local Register Office will allow an order for the certificate to be made. At no stage in any of this process can you see a copy of the actual certificate – this is hidden from view by law and no-one can reveal it to you. This is important because there are some unscrupulous individuals out there who would have you believe otherwise – and charge you for the privilege.

The actual copy of Walter's birth certificate not only revealed his birth date but also the location, his parents' names and his mother's maiden name as well as his father's occupation. It is this data, and particular his mother's maiden name, that is so crucial when building your family tree.

Using the same search facilities quickly identified Walter's parents' marriage date, pushing the family tree back a generation. Moving forward, it was also easy to find his marriage.

*Censuses every 10 years, starting in 1801, became a standard feature of the nation's statistical gathering regime. The first few censuses simply 'counted heads' in each area and since they contain no names or personal details are of no practical use to family historians. However, by the time of the 1841 Census, personal names were recorded in each household and this is where family historians start to investigate.

There was no census in 1941 (World War 2) and the records of the 1931 Census were destroyed by fire in 1942. With the 'hundred year' rule to protect personal confidentiality, the 1911 Census is currently the most recent one that has made (most) of its data publicly available.

For ordering copies of certificates, read on...

Ordering copies of certificates

The Registration District (Northampton in this example) has links to details about the district which can be particularly useful if/when it was combined into a larger existing, or newly created Registration District. This happened quite widely in the 1974 amalgamation of districts during wider local authority reorganisations.

Here we need to outline two sources of certificate copies, the pros and cons of these two routes, and the methods to access the sources.

Firstly, however, a repeat of the caution that appeared in part 1 of this article (Summer 2017 issue) – you've binned that copy, shame on you! However, all is not lost since we post copies on our community website – just look for *Newsletter* in the left-hand menu. Part 1 of this article is to be found on page 6 of this Summer 2017 issue. So, back to the important point; if you order from the General Register Office (GRO) you will be receiving a copy of the original copy forwarded to 'head office' by the appropriate Registrar's staff. This may contain a range of transcription errors – not an uncommon fact, particularly in these early days of systems when such devices as photocopiers – even typewriters – were not used. GRO can be found at www.gro.gov.uk, now part of HM Passport Office.

Once of the GRO site you will see a bold *Order certificates* online which takes you to the next page which has a bold *Order Certificates Online and search the GRO historic birth and death indexes* which takes you to a registration page. You have to create an account before you can use this system.

The next steps create your account and card payment information Finally, you are presented with input boxes for the basic information that the likes of the freebmd search on page 19 uncovered.

The current cost, including postage, is £9.25 per certificate.

The alternative, which this author prefers, is to use the data uncovered by freebmd to identify the present Register Office holding the original certificate(s). A quick Google search for the Registrar's office will yield phone and e-mail addresses as well as postal addresses. In my experience, using an e-mail to incorporate all of the same data required by the GRO is the most time efficient, but phone calls are just as effective. Although Registrars' offices use a range of different filing systems, they are experienced in translating the GRO data to their own. One significant difference between local Register Offices and GRO is that only the larger ones are equipped to accept payment by card. All of them, however, charge the same £9.25 per certificate.

Readers may remember the report on Muddy Fork in the Spring 2017 issue following a very kind donation by Clarborough & Welham IT Group – one of our very first. A lot has happened to this

'Gardening for Wellbeing' project, based at Nottinghamshire Wildlife Trust's Idle Valley Nature Reserve, since then.

A year ago, the project's funding from NWT had come to an end and efforts were being made to set it up as an independent charity. This was achieved last November, and thanks to a gratifying level of local support, successful funding applications, and the continuing goodwill of the Wildlife Trust, after a holding operation lasting a few months, the project worker was re-employed from March and the project was back in action.

The challenges presented by gardening in a nature reserve continue: the runner beans were demolished by a rogue rabbit, the acorns in the tree nursery have been attacked by mice, and if the local snails were an edible variety, Muddy Fork would have a healthy export market! But squashes and melons thrived in the polytunnel this year and somehow the redcurrant bushes were overlooked by the birds, so jelly is on the cards. And the Idle Valley café continues to feature produce from the garden – a lot of courgette cake has been eaten.

Muddy Fork now needs more participants (and is always happy to have offers of other support of any kind). Working outside in beautiful natural surroundings is beneficial for mental and physical health and there will be many who could benefit from the service (which is free). Mayflower Pilgrims from Bassetlaw

Almost four-hundred years after the momentous voyage of the Mayflower in 1620, we still do not know much about the roots of many of the Mayflower passengers. Therefore to be able to discover the origins of one of these is a very rare event. On September 11th at the Triennial Congress of the General Society of Mayflower Descendants in Plymouth, Massachusetts, not one but the origins of three linked Mayflower Pilgrims was revealed.

Two Pilgrims, William White, Dorothy May/Bradford, were shown to be uncle and niece, from the town of Wisbech in Cambridgeshire. The third, William's widow and later wife of one of Plymouth Colony's prominent citizens and three times Governor, Pilgrim Edward Winslow, was revealed to be the daughter of Separatist Richard Jackson who, like his Pilgrim neighbour, William Brewster, once lived at Scrooby Manor in Nottinghamshire.


I had been working on research into the origins of Dorothy Bradford's family when I sensed that I had possibly

stumbled upon something 'big' and so shared my findings with my trusted American friend and colleague, Mayflower historian Caleb Johnson. As a result we decided to continue the research together as a team with our shared researcher, Simon Neil.

The search for the origins of Susanna White hinged upon a poignant letter penned by Edward Winslow, her second husband, in 1623 and addressed to Susanna's 'uncle', Robert Jackson of Spalding, asking after the whereabouts and health of her unnamed father and her siblings. Much intense research into this letter had been carried out over the years but with each attempt the researchers were foxed as to finding the right family line. However Caleb, me and Neil had an advantage- my intimate knowledge of the Scrooby Separatists and the places they lived. A burial entry for a James Jackson of 'Braywell' in Yorkshire in the parish registers at Spalding sparked my immediate interest. I knew that 'Braywell' was in fact Braithwell, not far from Doncaster and that in the 1580's it was the home to a young teacher named Richard Jackson who I had previously researched and believed to be the later Separatist and leaseholder at Scrooby Manor. From this it was simply a case of sheer determined detective work drawing numerous other threads of information together which culminated in the proof we needed to make public our findings. Our research is being published in a three part article in The American Genealogist with part currently going to print.
