If your computer is on, simply do a Google search for *clarborough* - our website usually comes up just after Clarborough Primary School on the first page of Google hits. Just a few examples for starters...

Your latest, local, **weather forecast** is right near the top of the home page – just click on this to get the latest forecast.

PCSO Dave Airey's monthly Police Reports (*Law* & *Order* ▶ *Local Police Reports*).

The *Out-and-About* pages detail forthcoming events at Retford Library, Retford Hub, Bassetlaw Museum and others.

Drivers Targeted With Fake Fines

Action Fraud have received an increase in reports and intelligence where elderly victims are being targeted by individuals purporting to be police officers or traffic wardens. The victims are being approached whilst parked in a car park and are told by the suspect that they have parked illegally or broken a speed limit and a photo has been taken of their car for 'evidence'.


Victims are advised that they will face a substantial penalty fine unless they pay a smaller upfront fee immediately. Victims, who opt for paying the smaller penalty, will be directed to a parking meter and asked to enter their card and PIN. These parking meters have been tampered with by the suspect in order to retain the card.

Once the victim inserts their card and are asked for their PIN, the victims are shoulder surfed for their PIN by the suspect. Once victims input their PIN, the card is retained by the machine and victims are told by the suspect to seek help from the company who operates the parking meter or their bank.

What you need to do

- If you are suspicious about the authenticity of the fine, do not pay it until you have verified it with your local council.
- Ask to see the 'officials' identity card.
- Always shield your PIN from view when using an ATM machine, and never share your PIN with anyone.
- If your bank card is retained by an ATM machine, contact your bank immediately to inform them.

Nottinghamshire County Councillor Tracey Taylor



Council business paused during August as usual, but started back with a busy committee schedule. The Full Council meeting this month debated a number of matters which received almost unanimous cross-party support, including the overdue Green Paper on Health and Social Care, a raft of work to protect young people from criminal exploitation including County Lines, and

more work to develop electric vehicle technology and usage across Nottinghamshire.

I attended a number of events through September that celebrate Nottinghamshire's rich history and tell its modern story too. Residents from across the county attended the "Showcase Notts" event at County Hall mid-month. This included documents from the county's historical archives alongside displays for innovation and development of County assets, both buildings and open spaces, and information on the work of community and charitable groups. Many of the villages have hosted autumn fayres, and this year's Scrooby show saw the planting of the first "Pilgrim" apple tree, cultivated to mark next year's 400th anniversary of the Mayflower sailing. The new Pilgrims' Gallery at Retford's Bassetlaw Museum opened too.

During October I have been busy at Youth Services events. I visited NCC's outdoor education centre at St Michael's in Hathersage to celebrate its achievement as the first to be awarded Ambassador Centre Status by the Peak District National Park. The centre has provided outdoor learning experiences to thousands of pupils since opening in 1985, including pupils from Clarborough and neighbouring schools. The partnership with the National Park seeks to expand and enrich future opportunities. On Saturday 12th October I attended the 45th annual "Shadow" night-time orienteering event in Sherwood Forest. This is run by youth centre staff and volunteers, and included around 200 participants from the county's youth centres and uniformed groups. Fortunately I was not in charge of plotting the routes!

November and December see awards ceremonies for the year's events. The 4Uth Awards recognise young people who have excelled in some way, maybe through personal achievement in sport and activities, or through overcoming adversity in their own life circumstances. And finally the Duke of Edinburgh and Shadow awards in December will recognise those young people who've succeeded in those organised schemes. I'm very proud of NCC's youth service



Clarborough School Log Books and Clarborough Institute

As Clarborough School was preparing to move out of the Victorian building on Church Lane in 2008 your Editor arranged with Nottinghamshire County Council to make an edited transcript of the current Head Teacher's Log Book. Further enquiries with Nottinghamshire Archives resulted in me carrying out the same through all of the Log Books back to May, 1871*.

Readers will find these transcripts from 1871 to 1922 on our community website. However, with **VE75** now on the horizon I thought readers might be interested in the Log Book entries for the start of 1945:

22 Jan 1945 Attendance very low owing to severity of weather: Morning and afternoon 27 out of a possible 35.
30 Jan 1945 Heavy snowstorm wrecked the attendance today – 11 scholars only were present in the morning and 14 in the afternoon. Registers were not marked.

14 Feb 1945 School reopened this morning with 28 out of a possible 35. Several scholars reported to be suffering from Chicken Pox. Nurse visited school this morning on enquiry – re epidemic. Received 3 doz pencil crayons today.

22 Feb 1945 Only 19 scholars were present today. Fresh cases of Chicken Pox & contacts have reduced the number to such a low level.

26 Feb 1945 More cases of Chicken Pox reported today – 17 only out of 35 were present at each session.

20 Mar 1945 The school was closed today for the Test Examination for Entrance to Secondary Schools. Completed papers & unused booklets were dispatched today.

4 May 1945 Received instructions regarding closures for VE Day.

8 May 1945 VE Day – The school closed for 2 days – Reassembled on the 10th. Victory celebrations were held in the Institute on May 8th. Tea and games for children from 4 till 6.45. Thanksgiving Service at 7pm – Whist Drive & Dance at night and a Bon-fire about midnight.

The numbers of 'scholars' – pupils in today's language – illustrate how small was Clarborough in 1945; today's Primary School has around 140 on roll.

*It's worth noting that the very first entry in the first Log Book has tantalising hints of an earlier existence – possible directly following the 1870 Education Act that initiated compulsory 'state' schools but maybe also hinting at earlier 'church' school. Attempts to discover more on this have currently yielded nothing! This entry is:

1 May 1871 Clarborough Mixed School. This day I (Ellen Robinson) took the charge of the above named school. It has not been placed under government but is to be, though it has been subject to the Inspector's visits. I have not been able today to find out the childrens attainments so as to place them in the various standards.

The mention of *Clarborough Institute* is also tantalising since attempts over the years to find out more have yielded nothing – not even photos! Your Editor would much appreciate any information that readers can provide regarding Clarborough Institute mentioned in the 8th May, 1945 entry above. Having moved into Clarborough in the

mid-1970s we have dim memories of a building at the entrance to Church Lane but that's about it.

Further searches through all of the Log Books revealed two important entries regarding Clarborough Institute:

16 Nov 1908 A day's holiday was given by the Managers on the occasion of the New Institute in the Village.


22 Sep 1981 Meeting in Institute to discuss the building of a Parish Hall.

Any information about the Institute's history, governance or photographs would help to fill this gap in local history since nothing seems to exist in current records.

Adding all those other symbols to your word processed documents


Have you been wondering how people include the host of symbols that appear in professionally published material in their own word processed documents? Symbols such as:

© ¾ é Ü ß **>** ♥ **J** ... the list is almost endless!

Well, if you are using one of the major word processor application such as Apache OpenOffice, The Document Foundation LibreOffice or even Microsoft Word, the shortcut to these symbols is to be found under the heading of either *Special Character* or *Symbol*.

In the former apps the first of these is to be found under the *Insert* drop-down menu- Microsoft has confusingly moved its *Symbol* version around between versions, so you'll need to search!

Once you've clicked on any of these versions, a dialogue like that shown below opens up:



Your key controls here are the **slider** at the right-hand edge of the characters panel and the **font** shown in the labelled box at the top of the dialogue – shown in blue above.

Each of the different font displays have varying sets of characters – it is well worth experimenting by changing fonts via the little down-pointing arrow at the right-hand end of the font choice bar. Many of the fonts have the usual keyboard symbols at the top but quickly expose an array of characters not usually available from the keyboard. These start with some of the characters mentioned above but then continue to accented and umlauted character (French and German) followed by all sorts of other character sets. Towards the bottom you will also find a range of other useful characters including graphics characters.

If you explore the other fonts available we would strongly suggest you look at the 'w' ones that includes Webdings and Windings (1-3). These provide many of the other printable characters including most of those in the list at the top of this article.

To incorporate any chosen symbol in your document, firstly make sure your cursor is in the right position. Next click on your chosen symbol in the dialogue box. A larger version will appear on the right of the box – '2' is shown in the above illustration.

Finally, tap the **OK** or **Insert** (depends on app used) button in the window to add it to your document. Usefully, the dialogue remembers your last choice so if you need it again, just opening the dialogue will allow your to select it with one click.

The Hub is a community asset, and proud of being chosen to receive funding for the refurbishment from the *King and Miller* through the Sizzling Carling Community Action Award.



The shop was closed for a week in September: Hub volunteers, led by Chris Daniels, worked tremendously hard, removing stock, sorting, doing carpentry, painting and so on. They were joined on Action Day by volunteers from the *King and Miller*, and it was all filmed for a promotion video by a team from Sizzling Carling – there was even a drone taking overhead shots!

The Mayflower Pilgrim Centre is working well in conjunction with the newly opened Pilgrims Gallery attached to Bassetlaw Museum, and we have already had an influx of American visitors, including some by the name of Brewster! (If you don't know why this is significant, come and find out!)

The Hub is run entirely by volunteers: some work behind the scenes, where there is lot to do in various ways, and some like to be 'out front'. Obviously, quite a number of volunteers are needed to staff mornings and afternoons for six days a week, and whenever someone is away for whatever reason it is sometimes not possible to cover that slot. So we would like more people to come forward. It's not necessary to have any experience: we have friendly volunteers to help newcomers. It's an interesting experience: you meet old friends, greet visitors and welcome them to our town, and you really feel that you're at the heart of things – at The Hub! Do come and join us.

Public Rights of Way......Update

I recently completed the Triennial Survey of all the Public Rights of Way within Clarborough & Welham Parish. I am pleased to report that in general the footpaths, bridleways and byways are in good condition and continue to be an asset for the community.

There are a few exceptions to this clean bill of health as there are safety issues that need addressing.

There are ditch boards that are rotting and in urgent need of replacement, which have been reported to Nottingham County Council for rectification as a matter of urgency.

The most worrying aspect of the network is the poor condition of Market Hill [Byway No 22] which has been severely eroded over the past few years. I consider this to be a major hazard for both walkers and horse riders as some of the water filled ruts are 600mm deep.

This byway has a Seasonal Traffic Restriction Order in place which closes the byway to the passage of vehicles from 1st Nov to 30th April each year. Regretfully this has done little to preserve the fragile surface

Nottingham CC has been asked to review the situation and advise a comprehensive course of action to make it safe for all travellers.

On a less serious note, there are a few missing way markers which will, hopefully, be replaced in the near future should budgets allow.

I am indebted to several residents, who over the past year have drawn my attention to matters requiring attention. Their help has been invaluable in assisting to keep the network in good order.

We are very lucky to have such a comprehensive network of footpaths in the parish that can be freely used by walkers, cyclists and horse riders.

If anyone would like a map of the area with all the numbered paths highlighted, please contact me. I would be happy to provide paper copies or as an email attachment. You also might to like to explore a larger local area shown on Ordnance Survey Pathfinder Map 745 which covers not only Clarborough & Welham Parish but also several adjacent parishes.

Don't let the autumn or winter weather keep you indoors, don your boots, put on a jumper and enjoy our wonderful local countryside. Happy walking!!



For all those that have missed the sound of our bells ringing out over the village, the holidays are almost over, most bell ringers have now returned and practice nights have resumed, As most of you will know we have 8 magnificent bells but, like most other towers, are short of ringers. The nights are closing in and this would be an excellent opportunity for you to come and have a go. You might hate it, you might love it, but if you don't give it a go you will never know. You don't need to be super fit or strong, but you must have a good sense of humour! Tea and cake are much in abundance! Clarborough church 18:00 - 19:30 every Thursday.

We have now also got a set of handbells, oh yes!, so immediately after the tower bells we are having a practice on these, 19:30 - 21:00, so if you feel the big bells may be a step too far, come and have a go on the little bells. New technology fights rural crime in Clarborough

Rural crime officers joined landowners and gamekeepers in a targeted crackdown on illegal poaching in the Clarborough area. Armed with night-vision goggles and ANPR vehicle recognition technology, the team carried out a series of proactive night patrols in poaching hotspots in October as part of a national Rural Week of Action to tackle rural crime.

Rural officers now have the benefit of Nottinghamshire's new drone unit providing officers with a valuable "eye in the sky" and enabling their investigations to cover a greater area, including inaccessible and remote locations, more speedily. During the Clarborough operation, a vehicle linked to illegal poaching was stopped on the A1 and investigations are continuing.

Paddy Tipping, Nottinghamshire's Police and Crime Commissioner, said: "Technology is giving us a huge tactical advantage in the fight against rural crime, enabling us to conduct surveillance of vast areas of land while under cover. I'm really excited about Nottinghamshire's new drone unit, in particular, which is a vital tool in the detection of a whole range of rural and wildlife crimes including poaching, hare coursing, illegal hunting and agricultural theft.

"We have recruited additional officers to police our rural communities and invested in new resources and equipment, which are making a big difference to the safety of local communities. I'm positive with further multi-partner operations like those in Clarborough, we will continue to disrupt the criminal activities which bring misery to our rural communities and impact the livelihoods of local farmers and businesses."

Troos

The acute shortage of rain in 2018 and early 2019 - (who would believe that after the rain of the last few weeks?) - have taken their toll. A small number of trees have died as a result of the droughts despite our best efforts to water them. They will be replaced this winter.

Main Pasture

The Pasture was mown at the end of August. In mid-September, having allowed flower seed to fall from the dried plants, the resulting hay was baled and stacked. Unfortunately, due to the Wild Oat plants contained in the hay, it is unsuitable for either animal feed or bedding. If you are organising a bonfire for November 5th and would like some starting material then please contact our email address below.

We are considering the best approach in order to eliminate the Wild Oats from the Pasture, a difficult process as it is such a difficult weed to get rid of. We will let you know our ideas.

Wildflowers

The 3 "scrapes" have been sown with a mixture containing 100% wildflower seed. There are 19 different species of wildflowers in this mix. They should all flower in 2020 to produce a stunning display.

Santorini - an explosive past

Santorini in the Eastern Mediterranean figures in many holiday programmes. The island's white building capped cliffs and spectacular views of sun drenched blue seas have become *the* image of this part of the Mediterranean.



But many don't realise that what we see today is the result of one of the most violent eruptions in recorded history! The island itself is in the form of what geologists call a *caldera*. A *caldera* is a volcanic feature formed by the collapse of a volcano into itself, making it a large, special form of volcanic crater. A *caldera* collapse is usually triggered by the emptying of the magma chamber beneath the volcano, after a large volcanic eruption.

As we can see from this aerial view of the island and also the photo above, it has a number of smaller islands in the centre of the caldera – these are the result of more recent volcanic activity, most recently in 1950 although minor activity continues to this day. However, the cataclysmic event generating the caldera is dated to around 1650 BC. Much academic discussion has yielded different estimates of the violence of this eruption but all figures are truly

massive – some say that up to 60km³ (14 cubic miles) of material (technically known as *tephra*) was ejected. The eruption itself and particularly the volcano's collapse to form the caldera along with earthquakes before/during the eruptions generated tsunamis that destroyed coastal settlements as far away as the northern coast of Crete. Some have argued this to be what precipitated the decline of Crete's so-called Minoan civilisation.

Minoan? Meaning? This leads into the history of the whole Aegean and particularly Crete and mainland Greece – worth a lifetime of study!

However, back to our question – what does Minoan refer to? We are talking about the Bronze Age - from around 3000 BC until absorbed into wider Greek cultures from 1000 BC onwards, details are vague. What is fairly clear is that *Minoan* refers to *Minos*, either as a dynastic title or an individual ruler. The individual, known as Minos, is part of Greek mythology and as such is regarded the first King of Crete who ruled from Knossos, near modern Heraklion, on the north coast of Crete.

Clarborough Allotments

It's been a busy growing season on the allotment and it continues to evolve from the farmer's fields it started off as. Some allotment holders have found it too much with other commitments or have lost the battle with weeds and become disheartened while others have come in to take their place and seen the benefits a little hard work. There were some very impressive crops from some of the holders with everything from alliums to cucurbits performing well, once the weeds are removed and the clay soil is lightened with organic matter it is surprisingly fertile.



The decision to ban Metaldehyde slug pellets is reaping benefits with Song Thrushes successfully rearing young in adjacent gardens and the broken snail shells on the plots evidence of them feeding there, hedgehogs have also been present attracted by the available food and a couple of the plot holders are putting in hedgehog houses. Red mason bees were also noted nearby, these harmless and increasingly declining pollinators are a bonus on any allotment.

The hedgerow came back very strongly after being laid and became home to some nesting birds including migratory white throats, while the wildlife corridor around us played host to many seed eating birds.

Now starts the winter clearing and preparing for the next growing season so is a great time to get involved. If you fancy fresh air and exercise with organic fruit and veg as a reward then get in touch by emailing;

Pilgrims Gallery at Bassetlaw Museum is now Open!

An exciting and innovative new gallery has opened at Bassetlaw Museum in Retford, celebrating the life of William Brewster, one of the District's most famous sons. The Pilgrims Gallery is part of a £750,000 National Lottery-funded project which commemorates the 400th anniversary of the Mayflower's voyage to America in 1620. The Gallery was opened by Dr Jeremy Bangs, Director of The Leiden American Pilgrim Museum in the Netherlands, John Everitt, Committee member for the Midlands & East, representing The National Lottery Heritage Fund, the Lord Lieutenant of Nottinghamshire, Sir John Peace and Chairman of Bassetlaw District Council, Cllr Debbie Merryweather.

The Gallery has two sections: one part is a reproduction of an early 17th century study and the other is a contemporary exhibition space.



The study is not dissimilar to one which would have existed at Scrooby Manor where Brewster lived. In here, through a mirror, visitors see William recounting four stories: his early



life in North Nottinghamshire; the reasons why the Separatists wished to break away from the Church of England; the life the Pilgrims experienced in Leiden, Holland and finally, the journey aboard the Mayflower and their later life in America. There is also a 'story chair' where visitors can sit and listen to King James becoming angry with the Separatists; the child's voice of Jonathan Brewster talking about being forced to leave his home and everything he is familiar with; Mary Brewster, William's wife explaining her fears and also her faith, which enabled her to follow her husband to a new and unknown life ahead;

and a further story from a traveller along the Great North Road who recounts the secretive and dangerous times that existed in 1608.

The exhibition space includes interpretation highlighting the themes of Religious Tolerance, Freedom and Migration; challenges which are as relevant in today's world as they were when the Separatists fought for the right to practice their beliefs. There are panels that give more information on the women and children involved in the Pilgrim story, and others that tell of the Wampanoag, the Native Americans who lived in Massachusetts when the Mayflower landed in 1620. There are dressing up costumes for visitors of all ages, and old fashioned games such as Pilgrim dominoes contrast with guizzes on modern tablets. Bassetlaw District Council worked closely with Workhaus, the gallery designers, to ensure that visitors of whatever age would find the experience fun, entertaining and thought-provoking. Assigning children the character of one of the Mayflower's passengers for example, brings home to them the reality that half of the people who travelled on the ship died during that first winter in America.

Bassetlaw District Council's Deputy Leader Councillor Jo White said; "One of the features within the gallery that I am most proud of is how we have tackled telling the controversial aspects of the subject of colonisation. We have done this by working closely with the Wampanoag nation with whom we have built a strong relationship and they have written their own story and provided the images that accompany those panels".

John Everitt, Committee member for England: Midlands & East at The National Lottery Heritage Fund, said: "It's fantastic to see the gallery opening in time for the landmark Mayflower 400 anniversary next year. With many of the ship's passengers, the Separatists, being from the East Midlands, the story of the Mayflower is intrinsic to the heritage of the area, and thanks to National Lottery players the inspiring stories of their journeys and pursuit of tolerance and freedom, will live on through the gallery."

The 'Pilgrim Roots' made possible thanks to The National Lottery players, also includes the upgrading of an existing Mayflower Trail with new interpretation at Babworth, Scrooby and Sturton-le-Steeple in Nottinghamshire and Austerfield and Gainsborough in neighbouring counties; a new website **pilgrimroots.org** which is now live; an exciting events calendar associated with the Mayflower 400 anniversary in 2020 and the appointment of two additional members of staff, dedicated to improving the visitor experience and helping to tell the story of North Nottinghamshire's Mayflower pilgrims to the rest of the world.

Pilgrims Gallery opened on 19th September 2019 and is open Monday to Saturday 10:00 until 17;00. As part of a comprehensive evaluation plan, Bassetlaw District Council confirmed they would consider opening on a Sunday if there is a demand. The Gallery will also offer evening tours on pre-determined dates throughout the year.

Do I have to pay an arm-and-a-leg for printer inks?

With computer printers now so cheap many will quickly realise that the ink cartridges for common desktop printers can easily cost the same as the printer itself for a year's use. Savvy users will have found that it isn't necessary to buy 'own brand' cartridges – even for Hewlett-Packard models after the recent outcry when they were found to be preventing users 'shopping around'.

But is this the best option? In your editors opinion the short answer is 'No'. The only circumstance that really needs an inkjet printer is for anyone who must print single copies of photographs onto top-quality glossy, photo-paper. So what is the best solution?

The short answer is a laser printer. Now, five years ago this would have seemed a very expensive option but recent prices have come down to much the same level as inkjet printers. Add to this refill toner cartridges that generally last many times longer than their inkjet equivalents and any price difference fades into the insignificant.

A simple example is provided by my own monochrome (black) Brother Laser printer which is used for all of my correspondence, all of the worksheets that I print for every Clarborough & Welham IT Group class together with many personal uses. A replacement toner cartridge (6000 pages standard) comes in at around £40. My current cartridge has been in use as above since December, 2017.

A practical advantage of laser rather than inkjet made itself felt during my teaching career. I had to move between separate buildings for different classes and if the weather was wet it was essential to keep inkjet-printed worksheets covered, otherwise they got smudged; laser sheets are waterproof in this respect!

But wait a minute – isn't all of this only applicable if I don't want to print in colour? Well, yes, this is true for a monochrome laser printer – but again, in your Editor's situation, I have a Samsung colour laser printer which offers the same high quality printouts with replacement toners (three colours plus black) for around £70. I don't print anywhere as much with colour so my first set of toners (printer purchased in late 2017) are still in use.

But, isn't the print quality of laser colour printers lower than that from inkjet printers? This is a tricky question to answer because I have looked closely at photos printed on friends' inkjets and can see little if any difference between those and images I've printed on my Samsung laser printer. However (note the highlights!) when it comes to being economical, printing your own photos at home, on an inkjet printer is really a no-brainer. Recent Which? Reports have looked at this and found that typical inkjet printers cost around 45-55p per print using quality photo-paper for a typical 6"x4" print. Your Editor typically prints several hundred prints each year but does not do it at home. I use AldiPhotos (https://www.aldiphotos.co.uk/) who charge around 7p for a similar sized print on top-quality paper. Their service is excellent – typical orders being delivered in a few days.

The only proviso is that their standard postal charge is £1.99 irrespective of order quantity.

They offer a huge range of other products including photo prints up to A4 size for amazingly low prices.

So, to summarise; if you are finding your printing costs getting beyond a joke, look to replace your inkjet printer with a laser model – just monochrome if you don't need to print colour at home but even if you do some home colour printing, look to use online print services for substantial batches of photos.

If your laptop of desktop PC is too long in the tooth to handle Windows 10, this may mean you need to think about buying a new machine. Before considering that, it could be that getting hands-on experience of Windows 10 could be a good idea – look no further, our IT Group has a set of Windows 10 laptops you can use in our classes!

For just £20 for a full 5 week programme of 90 minute sessions you can not only get to grips with Windows 10, its desktop and new features but also access to a number of key applications. These are all free (legally!) and come from the open source movement. They include Apache OpenOffice (used to publish this Newsletter) and Document Foundation LibreOffice, both of which are full-feature alternative to Microsoft Office and also interface with the latter – reading and writing their file types. We also use Gimp digital image editor (used to process all of the images in our Newsletters including the front cover) along with free security applications.

Classes run on Tuesday afternoons (13:30-15:00) and Wednesday mornings (10:00-11:30) at Clarborough Village Hall. Book either 'block' of classes for just £20 and bring your own laptop or use one of our Windows 10 laptops. November-December classes start w/c 11th November and January-February classes resume w/c 6th January.

Community Flood Prevention

After the severe flooding in 2007, various agencies came together and agreed to take actions that would prevent a recurrence, if at all possible. The Parish Council has been encouraging the organisations involved and some progress has been made.

Responsibilities

We have tried to make sure the various agencies accept their responsibilities and tell us what they are doing:

The Environment Agency has overall responsibility for rivers and flooding. It holds the purse strings if we can get a scheme agreed that would offer protection against events such as those of 2007.

Nottinghamshire County Council (NCC) is the Lead Local Flood Authority. It investigates incidences of flooding and considers initiatives to prevent flooding.

Until recently, Bassetlaw District Council had 2 flood officers and a budget to carry out small-scale works. These 2 officers have retired and the responsibilities have transferred to NCC.

House owners have a responsibility to take steps to protect their property against flooding. There is advice available on the internet on the flood defences you can consider. Riparian owners – those who have a stream or river at the edge or running through their property – are responsible for maintenance of the course of the stream. Sometimes the riparian owner can be an agency such as Highways England, but often the house owner or landowner has the responsibility.

Engineering solution

Bassetlaw commissioned a report to look at ways of improving the flow of water through the villages to prevent flooding. This report is still under consideration. The latest iteration proposed a scheme to divert the dyke at the bottom of Church Lane and take overflow in a culvert across the fields and under the canal. We are pressing for a positive decision to be made on this possible scheme.

Natural Flood Management

There are examples across the country of landowners and communities supporting initiatives that ensure rainwater is diverted or delayed in periods of high rainfall. This involves the creation of bunds, leaky dams, planting trees and other initiatives. Southwell has successful examples of this in place. The NCC has agreed to look towards funding a feasibility study that would propose appropriate initiatives for our villages. Cooperation with and from landowners will be essential to any such scheme.

More Information

We plan to arrange a drop-in session in the Village Hall for all those interested in this topic. We will do this when we know more about the initiatives above.

Your Editor recently received the following from the local Scouts Group:


