Visitors to Eastwood's D.H. Lawrence Birthplace Museum will have a unique opportunity to go behind the scenes during its annual deep clean next month. the Museum will be offering two special behind the scenes conservation housekeeping tours, giving visitors the chance to see how museum collections are cared for, find out about the main culprits that can cause damage to items in the D.H. Lawrence Heritage collection, watch conservation housekeeping in action and even have a go at cleaning an object for themselves. Usually the museum would remain closed to the public for three weeks in January during the annual clean which uses specialist conservation housekeeping techniques to carefully clean each of the 1800 objects in the museum. This is essential not just for the appearance of the museum but also because dirt, dust and pests can cause objects to deteriorate over time, sometimes beyond repair. The tour will take place at 12 noon and last approximately 1 hour. Booking is essential as places are very limited and admission is £5 per person.

Creswell Crags is currently hosting a temporary exhibition called Mining Memories



The exhibition brings to life a number of oral history recordings which were taken as part of a Limestone Journeys project. These recordings document memories of the local mining industry and associated way of life, including different roles within the industry, the Creswell Pit Disaster of 1950, the role of the unions and even superstition of ghosts in the pit.

Creswell Crags is also asking the local community to get involved with the exhibition. Visitors who have memories of the local mining industry are invited to get in touch with the centre and to be recorded as part of the project. There is also training available for any volunteers who would like to be trained up in the use of the recording equipment and creating the oral history recordings.

Entry to the exhibition is free and it runs until 1st March.

Museum: Archaeology Now

Wednesday 28 January 1pm Djanogly Theatre

Investigating the lives of our earliest ancestors - Africa 3.5 - 1.5 million years ago.

Dr Hannah O'Regan from the Department of Archaeology will introduce our early forbears - *Australopithecus* and early *Homo*, and their lives in Africa between 3.5 - 1.5 million years ago. Her talk, based on recent research, will include questions of where and how they lived, and the dangers they faced in day-to-day life, from sabre-toothed cats and other large carnivores. Following the talk, Hannah will be available with casts of some of our ancestors (and an extinct cat or two), for a handling session at the museum.
